Requiring a determination of probable postfertilization age of an unborn child before abortion, prohibiting abortion of an unborn child considered capable of experiencing pain, informed consent, abortion reporting, granting rule-making authority, and providing a criminal penalty

Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill prohibits the performance of an abortion, except in a medical emergency, unless the doctor performing the abortion has made a determination of the probable postfertilization age of the unborn child. A person is prohibited from performing an abortion when the unborn child is considered to be capable of experiencing pain (unless the woman is undergoing a medical emergency) which the bill defines as a postfertilization age of 20 or more weeks. When the unborn child is considered capable of experiencing pain and the pregnant woman is undergoing a medical emergency, the doctor must terminate the pregnancy in the manner that provides the best opportunity for the unborn child to survive. A claim for damages may be brought against a person who violates the law. The bill provides various reporting requirements. In addition, the bill requires that the woman be informed, orally and in writing, of the probable postfertilization age of the unborn child and the numerical odds of survival.

Prosecutors believe that the amount of investigation required and the medical information that will be needed to prosecute such cases will put a significant burden on prosecutors. The bill calls for criminal prosecution as well as injunction actions by prosecutors. The State would need to hire expert witnesses to prosecute such matters putting further burdens on prosecutors' time and resources.

Due to a lack of data concerning how many cases may occur, a fiscal estimate is indeterminate.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications

For the reasons addressed above, a long-term fiscal estimate is indeterminate.
