### Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill eliminates the original jurisdiction of a court of criminal jurisdiction over a juvenile who is alleged to have committed certain violent crimes, including homicide and assault and battery. Rather, the juvenile would be subject to the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.

Prosecutors believe this will increase the workload in their offices, particularly in more rural counties where they may not have a full-time juvenile prosecutor capable of handling such serious cases. Juvenile law has a host of deadlines, waivers, and protocols for serious offenses, and prosecutors will need to be well-versed in these. Because it is uncertain how many of these cases could occur, a fiscal estimate is indeterminate.

### Long-Range Fiscal Implications

It is anticipated that there will be a long-term fiscal impact on DA offices, should this bill be enacted; however, due to the uncertainty regarding how many cases may occur, a fiscal estimate is indeterminate.
