Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

The bill creates grant programs to be administered by the Departments of Justice, Health Services, and Children and Families relating to drug trafficking, evidence-based substance abuse prevention, juvenile and family treatment courts, and drug treatment for inmates of county jails.

2017 Assembly Bill 481 creates the authority for counties and Indian tribes to receive grants to create and operate juvenile and family treatment courts. Under AB 481, counties and Indian tribes would be able to receive grants to establish and operate evidence-based programs to develop intake and court procedures that screen, assess, and provide dispositional alternatives for juveniles or parents whose children have come under the jurisdiction of the court. Subject to enactment of AB 481, this bill creates a new, annual appropriation funded at \$250,000 GPR in fiscal year 2018-19 for the Department of Children and Families (DCF) to award these grants to counties or Indian tribes to establish and operate juvenile and family treatment courts.

The bill also creates a new allocation under s. 49.175 to provide an additional \$500,000 in federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funds in fiscal year 2018-19 to the Brighter Futures initiative to provide grants for evidence-based substance abuse prevention to at-risk youth and their families. Grants could be provided to nonprofit corporations or public agencies in Milwaukee County or county departments in balance of state counties, and would be subject to some restrictions.

The department does not anticipate issues with using federal TANF funding for the Brighter Futures grants created under the bill. The department already allows for Brighter Futures grants to be provided to prevent and reduce the incidence of youth alcohol and other substance use and abuse, in order to satisfy the TANF purpose of encouraging the formation and maintenance of two-parent families.

Administration of the grants provided under the bill would require staff time in order to establish grant application processes, award criteria, and reporting and monitoring requirements. However, the department anticipates any additional work associated with administering the additional grant funding could be absorbed using existing resources.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications

The TANF structural deficit under Act 59 (the 2017-19 biennial budget) is estimated at \$60 million. This bill would increase the structural deficit by \$500,000.
