## Clearinghouse Rule 22-060 – creating ch. Jus 20 (relating to the storage and processing of sexual assault kits)

The Department of Justice (DOJ) held one public hearing on October 13, 2022, for Clearinghouse Rule 22-060, which proposes to create chapter Jus 20 relating to the storage and processing of sexual assault kits.

DOJ received no written comments on the proposed rule and one oral comment at the October 13, 2022, hearing, which is summarized below. The individual listed below commented on her own behalf.

The form has signature lines for the health care professional and victim to acknowledge that a discussion occurred of the options available to the victim. A copy of this form is provided to the victim after the sexual assault forensic examination.

Of note on the form is specific information for the victim who elects to have evidence collected at the exam but chooses not to report the assault to enforcement. law follows: after collection of will the kit. itsubmitted by the health provider to care Wisconsin State Crime Laboratories for storage. The crime lab will store the kit (without testing) for at least 10 years.

If the victim chooses to later report the assault to law enforcement, this report will need to be made within 9.5 years after collection of the kit. The reasoning for the need to report six months prior to the disposal date is to allow the crime lab time to analyze the kit, and for charges to be filed in court by the prosecution prior to the

statute of limitations expiring for the assault at 10 years, as applicable to second- and third-degree sexual assaults.

The final statement on the form for the non-reporting reads: victim understand that, after ten years, if I haven't reported assault to law the enforcement, the Wisconsin State Crime Laboratory will permanently dispose of the evidence from my medical forensic exam without any further notification to me, unless I opt-in to notification through the Track-Kit system."

The Wisconsin Sexual Kit Tracking Assault System (also known as Track-Kit<sup>TM</sup>) is a webbased application that allows the victim to view their kit's location—from the medical facility to law enforcement to the crime laboratory. The application also allows a victim to opt in to receive e-mail or text-message notifications when their kit location changes, and if the victim has chosen not to report the assault to law enforcement, receive а reminder notification that their kit

is approaching its date for permanent disposal after 10 years.

For victims who choose to have the reminder notification, they would receive it one year prior to the disposal of their kit by the crime laboratory. The previously mentioned "Information and Options" form will contain Wisconsin Sexual Assault Kit Tracking System barcode that is specific to the kit used for victim's exam and contains temporary password allowing the victim to log in and access kit-tracking the application.
