ORDER OF THE DEPARTMENT OF LOCAL AFFAIRS AND DEVELOPMENT ADOPTING AND AMENDING RULES

Pursuant to authority vested in the Department of Local Affairs and Development by section 22.40, Wisconsin Statutes, the Department of Local Affairs and Development hereby amends rules as follows:

Ch. Exp 2 of the Wis. Adm. Code is amended to read: (See attached sheets.)

The amendments contained herein shall take effect on January 1, 1972.

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EXP 2.01 PREMIUMS AND EXHIBITS.

- (1) Fairs contemplating making a claim for state aid must submit 2 copies of a revised premium list to the department not later than May 1st of the year in which the fair is held. These lists will be checked and one copy returned with any necessary notations. State aid shall be allowed only on premiums approved by the department.
- (2) No fair is permitted to make any deductions from premium money won by an exhibitor.
- (3) A fair may charge an entry fee not in excess of 10% of the purse offered on any specific article. The state aid authorized by section 22.40 (4), Wis. Stats., will be paid on net premiums only. Net premiums shall be construed to mean total premiums paid less total entry fees received.
- (4) No fair is permitted to require exhibitors in the educational department to purchase exhibitor's tickets. Other exhibitors may be required, when no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for season tickets.
- (5) When no entry fee is charged, the fair may charge stall rent in the horse, cattle, sheep and swine departments. In the horse department the rental shall not exceed \$1.50 per single stall, and \$3 for box stalls; in the cattle department \$1 for single stalls, and \$2 for box stalls; in the swine department and sheep department \$2 per pen or 50 cents per animal. A standard pen should be approximately 64 square feet. In the poultry, rabbit, and pet stock department the charge shall not exceed 25 cents per head and such charge shall include feed and care. These are maximum charges in each case. Fairs may charge less if they desire.
- (6) State aid will not be approved for separate classes for local and non-local exhibitors.
- (7) In case the local breed association or any other organization donates a portion of the prize money, state aid will be allowed only on that portion of the prize money paid by the fair association.

- (8) No state aid will be paid on out-of-state exhibits. In case Wisconsin residents who have out-of-state addresses win prizes on exhibits, the fair secretary must provide the department with an affidavit that such exhibitors are residents of Wisconsin.
- (9) (a) In the junior fair department, state aid will be paid on prizes offered to exhibitors from 9 to 21 years of age in the following classes: club products, demonstration teams, judging teams, showmanship contests, and educational booths. State aid will not be paid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or any project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.
 - (b) In the junior fair department, all exhibitors must be members of 4-H, FFA, FHA, or any other youth organization having adult leadership.
 - (c) Exhibits in the junior fair must be a result of the exhibitors project or projects in which he or she is regularly enrolled, and must be the result of the members own labor.
- (10) Premiums in the educational departments must be paid direct to the pupil making the exhibit and not to the school or teacher, except for group premiums offered to the competing schools. A complete list of exhibitors and a complete set of judges' sheets for the education department, like those required in other departments, must be filed with the department. No aid will be paid on education department premiums unless this is done. All educational exhibits must be on display at the fair even though they are judged prior to the fair.
- (11) State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or order; no state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups or trophy prizes.
 - (12) Exhibitors shall not be required to become members of the fair society, or be required to make any donations or refunds.
 - (13) Premiums offered must be definite in amount; fairs cannot decrease or increase the published premiums depending on the financial conditions of the organization or for any other reason.
- (14) State aid will not be allowed on horse pulling contests.
- (15) (a) No state aid will be allowed on more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in individual livestock classes, nor on more than one premium in all other classes.
 - (b) In the junior fair department, no state aid will be allowed on more than 1 premium awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number.
 - (c) To be eligible for state aid, no animal or article shall compete for more than one premium except as part of a herd group or special premium.
- (16) State aid will be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in exhibit buildings or actually shown in the show ring during the regular fair dates. State aid will not be paid on D.H.I.A. records,

- (17) No state aid will be paid to fairs having split dates, unless prior written approval is granted by the department at the time the premium list is approved. Extreme hardship must be established by the fair organization before approval will be granted. By a split date, the department means a fair which exhibits or contests judged, and premiums paid at more than one time or at more than one location during the current year. When split dates are granted, all blue ribbon winners must repeat their demonstration or exhibit at the regular fair on regular fair dates.
- (18) The officers of each fair must mail a premium list to every other association, society or board conducting a fair in Wisconsin; lists of fairs will be furnished by the department.
- (19) Fairs shall publish Wis. Adm. Code sections Exp 2.01 and Exp 2.06 in their premium books.
- (20) Fairs must indicate exact dates of their fair when submitting premium books, and must promptly advise the department of any change in dates later in the season.
- (21) No state aid will be paid on exhibits removed from the fair grounds prior to 4 p.m. of the last day of the fair. In cases of extreme hardship, special permission for earlier removal may be granted by the department. This approval must be obtained in writing prior to the fair.

EXP 2.02 UNIFORM PREMIUM LISTS.

- (1) GENERAL PROVISIONS. In all prescribed divisions that do not specify any breed, item or article, there may be separate classes for any recognized breed, item or article, and state aid in the amounts prescribed will be allowed for such classes in each breed, item or article.
- (2) Classes may be combined, but state aid shall be limited to maximum premiums listed for a single class or such animals, items or articles.
- (3) No state aid will be paid on premiums awarded for any male animals (other than those which have been desexualized) exhibited in any class unless the animal is registered or eligible for registry as a purebred.
- (4) Animals entered in group classes shall also be exhibited in a class for individuals.
- (5) State aid for premiums awarded for horses in open classes shall be limited to horses which are owned by the exhibitor and are the offspring of the exhibitor's mare or stallion.
- (6) The total of the maximum premiums prescribed for the places in any open class of livestock (except poultry) may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places and the maximum premium for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum prescribed for the last place in such class.

- (7) When there are 16 or more animals, items or articles entered in any junior fair class, at the discretion of the fair, the class may be divided into two approximately equal groups and each group judged as a class.
- (8) In the swine departments, all mature boars must have tusks removed.
- EXP 2.03 UNIFORM PREMIUM LISTS. DEFINITIONS.
 - (1) INDIVIDUAL CLASSES.
 - (a) Dairy cattle.
 - 1. A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of exhibit year. The calf must be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.
 - 2. A senior calf is one born during the period July 1 to December 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
 - 3. A junior yearling is one born during the period January 1 to June 30 of year preceding exhibit year.
 - 4. A senior yearling is one born during the period July 1 to December 31 of second year preceding exhibit year. If senior yearling has calved, it shall be shown in 2-year-old class.
 - 5. A 2-year-old is one born during the period July 1 of third year preceding exhibit year to June 30 of second year preceding exhibit year, and shall include senior yearlings which have freshened.
 - 6. A 3-year-old is one born during the period July 1 of fourth year preceding exhibit year to June 30 of third year preceding exhibit year.
 - 7. A 4-year-old is one born during the period July 1 of fifth year preceding exhibit year to June 30 of fourth year preceding exhibit year.
 - 8. A 5-year-old is one born before July 1 of fifth year preceding exhibit year.
 - (b) Beef Cattle.
 - 1. A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of exhibit year. The calf must be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.
 - 2. A senior calf is one born during the period September 1 to December 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
 - 3. A summer yearling is one born during the period May 1 to August 31 of year preceding exhibit year.

- 4. A junior yearling is one born during the period January 1 to April 30 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 5. A senior yearling is one born during the period September 1 to December 31 of second year preceding exhibit year.
- 6. A 2-year-old and older is one born before September 1 of second year preceding exhibit year.

(c) Steers.

- 1. A senior calf is one born during the period September 1 to December 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 2. A summer yearling is one born during the period May 1 to August 31 of year preceding exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth in place.
- 3. A junior yearling is one born during period January 1 to April 30 of year preceding exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth in solidly and shows no nicking at gums.

(d) Swine.

- 1. A mature boar or sow is one born during the period July 1 of third year preceding exhibit year to December 31 of second year preceding exhibit year.
- 2. A junior yearling boar or sow is one born during the period January 1 to June 30 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 3. A senior boar or sow is one born during the period July 1 of the year preceding exhibit year to December 31 of the year preceding exhibit year.
- 4. A senior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the period of January 1 to February 28 or 29 of exhibit year.
- 5. A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the period March 1 to June 30 of the exhibit year.

(e) Sheep.

- 1. A mature ram or ewe is one born before January 1 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 2. A yearling ram or ewe is one born during the period of January 1 to December 31 of year preceding exhibit year.
- 3. A ram or ewe lamb is one born on or after January 1 of exhibit year.

(f) Goats.

- 1. A junior doe is one born after March 1 of the exhibit year.
- 2. A senior doe is one born after July 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and before March 1 of the exhibit year.

- 3. A yearling goat is one born after July 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year, and before July 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- 4. A two year old goat is one born after July 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and before July 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
- 5. A goat three years old and older is one born before July 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

(g) Poultry.

- 1. Cock and hen birds are birds hatched before January 1 of the exhibit year.
- 2. Cockerel and pullet birds are birds hatched on or after January 1 of exhibit year.

(2) GROUP CLASSES.

- (a) Dairy and Beef cattle.
 - 1. A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one can be a bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull from junior calf and/or senior calf bull and heifer classes with both sexes to be represented.
 - 2. A dairy senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be two years of age or over, and not more than one can be a bull. A beef senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals, the offspring of one sire, and may be from the following ages: summer yearling, junior yearling, senior yearling and over 2 year old bull and heifer classes, both sexes to be represented. In both dairy and beef gets of sire, the name of the sire to be designated and the animals need not be owned by one exhibitor.
 - 3. A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals, any age and any sex which are the produce on one cow.

(b) Swine.

- 1. A pen of market pigs shall consist of 2 animals, barrows and/or gilts and shall weigh over 150 pounds each.
- 2. A pen of young market pigs shall consist of 2 animals, barrows and/or gilts and shall weigh between 60 and 150 pounds each.
- 3. A pen of 3 feeder pigs, 40 to 60 pounds each may consist of either sex. When male pigs are included, they must be castrated and healed.

- 4. A spring group shall consist of 1 spring boar pig and 2 spring sow pigs owned by the exhibitor.
- 5. A get of sire shall consist of 4 animals of both sexes, sired by the same boar.
- 6. An exhibitor's herd shall consist of 1 senior boar pig or 1 junior yearling boar, 1 junior yearling sow, 1 senior sow pig, and 1 junior pig to show, all of which are owned and shown by the exhibitor.
- 7. A young herd shall consist of 1 boar and 3 gilts, all of which are senior or junior pigs to show.

(c) Sheep.

- 1. A flock shall consist of 1 ram any age, 1 ewe over 2 years old, 1 yearling ewe and 1 ewe lamb, all of which shall be owned by the exhibitor.
- 2. A pen of lambs shall consist of 3 lambs (1 ram, 2 ewes), which are owned by the exhibitor and are offspring of exhibitor's animals.
- 3. A pen of market lambs shall consist of 2 lambs, wethers or ewes, which are owned by the exhibitor.

(d) Goats.

- 1. An exhibitor's herd shall consist of 1 doe under 1 year, 1 yearling doe, and 1 doe 2 years old and over, all of which are owned by the same exhibitor.
- 2. A get of sire shall consist of three does any ages, sired by the same sire, all of which are owned by the same exhibitor.

 - 2. Semi-Aged and Mild Cheddar cheese shall be not less than 3 months old and not over 7 months old prior to the date of the fair.
 - 3. Fresh Cheddar cheese shall be not less than 1 month or more than 3 months old prior to fair date.

- (c) In addition to prizes listed, the following will be offered: \$1.50 for 92 score and \$1.00 for each full point over 92 on the first four places only.
- (d) Butter, cheese and dairy butter will be judged on a standard scale of 100 as follows:

EXP 2.06 JUDGING REGULATIONS.

- (1) Judging shall be done at county and district fairs only by men and women approved by the department for that purpose. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.
- (2) Each judge shall be provided with a copy of the premium book at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair at which he or she shall act as a judge.
- (3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.
- (4) (a) No state aid will be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any classes except in the junior and educational departments.
 - (b) When classes in the junior and educational departments are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings must be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first two groups and not more than 6 in the first three groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first two groups, and not more than 75% in the first three groups.
 - (c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

EXP 2.07 ACCOUNTING REQUIREMENTS.

- (1) All receipts from any source whatsoever shall be deposited in a bank, and all accounts without exception shall be paid by check or order. All records, papers, stubs, checks, vouchers or orders relating to fair transactions shall be preserved for a 6-year period subsequent to the year in which the same were made or issued.
- (2) Premiums must be actually paid or bona fide notice of premium award must be sent to all premium winners before a claim for state aid will be considered.
- (3) Claims for state aid must be filed within 30 days after the close of the fair, and must include:
 - (a) Judges' sheets filled out and signed in accordance with instructions on the blanks. No state aid will be allowed on unsigned judges' sheets or sheets signed by judges who have not been approved by the department for that purpose. Judges' sheets with the exception of the judge's column should be completely filled, if possible, by typewriter. The total premiums awarded on each judge's sheet must be shown on the bottom of same.

- (b) Index of exhibitors and their addresses, with amounts paid in premiums opposite each name. The total of each index sheet must be shown on the bottom of same, and the total of the index must correspond with the total of premiums awarded as shown by judges' sheets.
- (c) Two voucher claims for state aid.
- (d) One premium book.
- (4) One copy of the annual financial report must reach the office of the department before the end of the calendar year in which the fair is held. The state aid received for the current year must be included as a receipt in such statement.
- (5) Before submitting its financial report, every fair association, society or board shall have its accounts audited by either a certified public accountant, a county auditor, or an auditing committee, one of which must be familiar with records and procedures, appointed by the officers of the fair organization. The society or board shall submit to the department at the time the financial report is submitted, a statement of how the audit was done, and the date and name or names of those who did the auditing, or a copy of the audit report.
- (6) The copy of a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which the fair was held which was published within 120 days after the fair held by their organization showing the financial condition of the organization before and after the fair. Such financial statement shall include all such receipts, disbursements, accounts receivable and accounts payable in connection with the operation of the fair as is required by the department.
