Adopting, Amending, and Repealing Rules

Pursuant to authority vested in the State Superintendent of Public Instruction by Section 115.28(7), Wisconsin Statutes, he hereby repeals, amends, and adopts rules as follows:

PI 3.03(4)(c) is repealed and recreated to read:

(c) As of July 1, 1972, a license covering the broad field social studies will be granted upon the basis of completion of a minimum of 54 semester credits, to include a 22 semester credit concentration in one of the following subject areas: anthropology, economics, geography, history, political science, psychology, or sociology; and a minimum of 32 semester credits distributed over at least three of the other above listed social studies subjects; or a 34 semester credit concentration in one of the above listed social studies subjects, and a minimum of 20 semester credits distributed over at least two of the other above listed social studies subjects. Certification in broad field social studies will permit teaching in only the concentration and the fusion courses, not in all social studies subjects. (The fusion courses are those drawn from several of the social studies disciplines and, therefore, require a composite preparation in social studies. Fusion courses include civics, social problems, American problems, area studies, vital issues, etc.)
