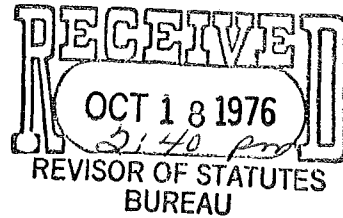



ORDER OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN NATURAL RESOURCES BOARD

REPEALING, AMENDING, REPEALING & RECREATING AND CREATING RULES

Pursuant to authority vested in the State of Wisconsin Natural Resources Board
by sections 23.09, 29.085, 29.174 and chapter 227, Wisconsin Statutes, the Natural
Resources Board hereby repeals, amends, repeals & recreates and creates rules as
follows:

SECTION 1 - Sections NR 19.09 (2) (c), (k) and (m) are amended to read:

(c) Burnett county. Bashaw lake, Big Clam lake, Briggs lake, Gaslyn lake,
Long lake, Loon lake, Mud Hen lake, Rice lake.

(k) Sawyer county. Musky bay located in sections 10 and 11, T39N, R9W on Big
Lac Court Oreilles lake.

(m) Washburn county. Gilmore lake, Mud lake, Rice lake, Spring lake, Transus
lake.

There is no closed season for the harvesting or gathering of wild rice in any
other area of the state of Wisconsin not herein described.

SECTION 2 - Section NR 20.015 is created to read:

NR 20.015 Definitions. For the purpose of this chapter, the following terms

(1) Fisher means any person engaged in fishing.

SECTION 4 - Section NR 20.04 (4) is amended to read:

(4) Experimental Waters; Permits; Reports. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch or kill fish or fish for fish in the waters of Nebish, Spruce, Mystery, Escanaba and Palette lakes situated in sections 34 and 35, township 42 north, range 7 east, and sections 1, 2, 3, 10, 11 and 12, township 41 north, range 7 east, Vilas county except under the following conditions:

1. Fishing in such waters is authorized only under permit, which may be secured at the checking stations indicated by posted signs in the immediate area.

2. Fishing in such waters shall be done only with hook and line or rod and reel except that cisco may be taken in Palette lake by means of licensed dip nets or seines.

3. The provisions of this section shall apply to such waters throughout the year.

4. All permits are valid only for the date issued and shall be turned in at the checking stations at the termination of each day's fishing activities by the fisher.

5. There is a continuous open season with no daily bag limit or size limit for all species of fish contained in these waters except in Nebish lake there shall be a daily bag limit of 10 trout in aggregate and an 8-inch minimum size limit for smallmouth bass.

6. All fish taken pursuant to this section shall be exhibited to the department or its agents at the checking station for examination, identification and marking.

SECTION 5 - Section NR 20.04 (5) (a) 3. is repealed.

SECTION 6 - Sections NR 20.04 (7) and (8) are created to read:

(7) Experimental Trophy Trout Streams. (a) Castle Rock creek -- In, on or along that part of Castle Rock creek, Grant county, from the Church Road bridge in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 36, T7N, R2W, downstream to the county trunk Q bridge in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 31, T7N, R1W.

(b) Doc Smith creek -- In, on or along that part of Doc Smith creek, Grant county, from the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 1, T6N, R2W, downstream to its mouth (Castle Rock creek).

(c) For the purpose of this section it shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, or kill fish, or fish for fish by any means other than the use of an artificial fly by the method commonly known as "fly fishing" and with the use of artificial lures. Artificial fly means a single hook dressed with fur, feathers, hair silk, tinsel, thread or similar material to imitate the natural food of trout. An artificial lure means a bait designed to attract fish which does not include any natural bait.

1. There is a 0 bag limit for trout and the open season is from January 1 to September 30, both dates inclusive.

(d) Race-Willow creek - In, on or along that part of Race-Willow creek, St. Croix county, known as the Race in the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ and the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 8; SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$, NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$, and the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 17; and the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 18, T29N, R19W, a trout daily bag limit of one fish is established, the minimum size limit of which shall be 13 inches. The open season is the first Saturday in May beginning at 5:00 a.m. through September 30, both dates inclusive.

1. For the purpose of this section, fishing is restricted to fly fishing and artificial lures described in NR 20.04(7)(c).

(8) Experimental Trout Lakes (Ponds). (a) Bayfield county. 1. The following Bayfield county lakes (ponds) shall be open for trout fishing on even year dates only.

- a. Anderson
- b. Blaisdell

2. The following Bayfield county lakes (ponds) shall be open for trout fishing on odd year dates only.

- d. Spring

(b) The open and closed seasons and other regulations established by this section shall apply to NR 20.03(1)(f)1.f. and NR 20.03(1)(f)3.

SECTION 7 - Section NR 20.06 (1) (b) introductory paragraph is amended to read:

(b) Trolling. It shall be unlawful for any person to take, capture or kill fish or fish for fish of any variety at any time in the inland waters of the state from a motor-driven boat when the motor is running or from any boat in tow of a motor-driven boat when the motor is running or from any sailboat when in motion; or by means of shutting or drawing off water for that purpose. Casting and immediate retrieval of a bait or lure while positioning a boat by means of an electric motor, where motors are permitted, shall not be deemed trolling. The restrictions in this paragraph do not apply to the waters of Barron, Bayfield, Burnett, Douglas, Polk, Racine, Rusk, Taylor, Washburn and Waukesha counties and the following named lakes and rivers including their flowages and sloughs:

SECTION 8 - Section NR 20.07 (1) (ff) is repealed.

SECTION 9 - Sections NR 20.07 (2) and (3) are repealed and recreated to read:

(2) No person shall, except as expressly provided, possess or control on any of the inland waters or shores of inland waters at any time any gun, bow and arrow, spear, net or similar device that might be used for the purpose of taking, catching or killing fish.

(3) It shall be lawful to take rough fish by hand at any time in all waters.

(4) Unlawful possession of equipment. (a) It is unlawful as prescribed in subsection (2) to take, catch or kill fish in the counties of Ashland (except in the Bad river as provided in subsection (e)), Bayfield, Iron, Oconto (in that portion of the county west of highway #141 only), Oneida, Pierce, Price, Sawyer and Vilas counties and except that rough fish may be taken sunrise to sunset with bow and arrow from the Saturday nearest May 20 to July 1 each year in Iron county.

(b) It shall be lawful to take rough fish by means of spear or spear fishing by the method commonly known as skin diving or bow and arrow from April 21 to March 1, inclusive, sunrise to sunset in the inland waters or from shores of inland waters of Brown, Buffalo, Calumet (except during a sturgeon spearing season in any specified water), Chippewa, Clark, Door, Dunn, Eau Claire, Florence, Fond du Lac (except during a sturgeon spearing season in any specified water), Forest, Green Lake, Jackson, Juneau, Kewaunee, La Crosse, Langlade, Lincoln, Manitowoc, Marathon (except that spearing is prohibited in the Big Eau Pleine flowage from the dam upstream to highway 97 from November 1 to April 20), Marinette, Monroe, Oconto (in that portion of the county east of highway 141 only), Outagamie (except during the sturgeon spearing season in any specified water), Pepin, Portage, St. Croix, Shawano, Trempealeau, Winnebago (except Waukau creek and during a sturgeon spearing season in any specified water), and Wood.

(c) It shall be lawful for any person to take rough fish by means of spears or by spear fishing by the method commonly known as skin diving or bow and arrow at any time of the year, sunrise to sunset, in the inland waters or from shores of inland waters of the counties of Adams, Columbia, Crawford, Dane, Dodge, Grant, Green, Iowa, Jefferson, Kenosha, Lafayette, Marquette, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Racine, Richland, Rock, Sauk (except it is illegal to spear fish while skin diving or with bow and arrow in Devil's lake), Sheboygan, Vernon, Walworth, Washington, Waukesha, Waupaca, Waushara (except during a sturgeon spearing season in any specified water), and in Waukau creek in Winnebago county.

(d) It is lawful to take white bass, yellow bass (striped), rock bass, crappie, bluegill, perch, pumpkinseed (sunfish) and bullheads with the use of spears and spearguns by skin diving and scuba diving in all waters where spearing for rough fish is permitted subject to the same seasons prescribed in subsection (4)(a), (b), (c) and (e) and subject to bag limits prescribed in section NR 20.03, Wis. Adm. Code.

(e) It shall be lawful for any person to take rough fish by means of spears or by spear fishing by the method commonly known as skin diving or bow and arrow, sunrise to sunset, from the Saturday nearest May 20 to November 1, inclusive, on the inland waters or from shores of inland waters in the counties of Burnett, Douglas, Rusk, Taylor, Washburn, Polk and Barron. Burbot (but no other species) may also be speared from sunset to sunrise in the Amnicon and Nemadji rivers and the Black river upstream to the Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault Ste. Marie railroad bridge from December 15 to January 15, inclusive, in Douglas county and the Bad river, Ashland county.

SECTION 10 - Section NR 20.07 (5) (b) 1. is repealed.

SECTION 11 - NR 20.12 (1), (5) and (8) are amended to read:

(1) For the purpose of this section, a setline is defined as a line with a hook, or hooks (excluding stainless steel hooks) fastened to it and designed to be set and left in the water for the purpose of taking fish.

(5) No setline shall be equipped with hooks of a size smaller than 5/0. No set or bank pole shall be equipped with hooks of a size smaller than 3/0. Stainless steel hooks are prohibited.

(8) Setlines equipped with not more than 25 hooks and set or bank poles may be used from the Saturday nearest May 20 to September 30 in the waters of Lake Winnebago, Lake Butte des Morts, Little Lake Butte des Morts, Lake Winneconne, Lake Poygan, in the Wolf river downstream from the mouth of the Rat river in Winnebago county, in the Fox river downstream from Lake Butte des Morts to the dam in the city of DePere. On such setlines it shall be unlawful to use any frog, crayfish or fish or part thereof except that a square chunk cut from fish may be used. The bag and size limits established in the season tables shall apply except that there shall be no bag limit on catfish in the waters defined in this subsection and catfish in the above-named waters shall not be construed to be game fish and may be sold.

SECTION 12 - Section NR 20.13 (3) (a) is amended to read:

(3) Size of Holes for Ice Fishing. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to cut, use or maintain a hole larger than 12 inches in diameter or square for the taking of fish in any manner through the ice, except for spearing of fish in Lake Superior and except for dip netting, the taking of minnows by minnow traps, and for skin diving purposes.

SECTION 13 - Section NR 20.15 (1) (j) is created to read:

(j) Beaver Dam lake in Dodge county.

SECTION 14 - Section NR 20.16 is repealed.

SECTION 15 - Section NR 21.015 is created to read:

NR 21.015 Definitions. For the purpose of this chapter, the following terms are defined as follows:

(1) Fisher means any person engaged in fishing.

(2) Fishing includes taking, capturing or killing fish or fishing for fish of any variety at any time in the waters of the state.

SECTION 17 - Sections NR 21.08 (1) and (3) are amended to read:

(1) It shall be unlawful for any person to set or operate more than 8 set-lines (trot lines) with not to exceed a total of 50 hooks to each line and not to exceed a total of 400 hooks in the aggregate, for the taking, catching, killing,

or fishing for catfish 15 inches or over in length, hackleback sturgeon 25 inches or over in length, bullheads and rough fish only; size limits, except catfish, shall conform to the provisions of section NR 21.03; in such fishing it shall be unlawful to use any frog or game fish, or part thereof either dead or alive as bait in the Mississippi river and Lake Pepin. The operation of legal setlines is permitted in the waters of the Mississippi river and Lake Pepin only and it shall be unlawful for any person to set, use, place or operate any setline in the boundary waters of the St. Louis river, the St. Croix river and Lake St. Croix as defined in section NR 21.01.

(3) At one end of every licensed setline (trot line) there shall be placed and maintained a white flag, not less than 16 inches square, with the upper end of the staff extending at least 2 feet above the water and numbered with figures at least 3 inches in height corresponding with the number of the license authorizing the use of such setline. It shall be lawful to use buoys in lieu of flags providing that same are numbered with figures at least 3 inches in height corresponding with the number of the license authorizing the use of such setline.

SECTION 18 - Section NR 21.20 is repealed and recreated to read:

NR 21.20 Fish Refuges. It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, disturb, kill or fish for fish of any variety in any manner from March 15 through April 25 both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

(32) La Crosse county. (a) That part of the Mississippi river beginning at the Onalaska dam, in the city of Onalaska, and extending downstream for a distance of 300 feet.

SECTION 19 - Section NR 22.08 (6) is created to read:

(6) Setlines shall be lifted and fish removed at least once every 48 hours.

SECTION 20 - Section NR 23.03 (1) is amended to read:

NR 23.03 Hook and line fishing. (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to use or operate more than 2 lines or 2 poles with one line attached to each pole, and with an aggregate total not to exceed 4 hooks or to leave any fish line or lines unattended in any waters or to take any fish by snagging or fouling in any manner. Unless otherwise provided, any such fish taken other than in the mouth by snagging or fouling must immediately be returned to the water.

SECTION 21 - Section NR 23.08 is amended to read:

NR 23.08 Reciprocity. All residents of Wisconsin and Michigan holding a resident fishing license from their respective states, or residents of states other than Wisconsin and Michigan holding an angling license issued by either state, may fish in any of the waters listed in section NR 23.01. This reciprocity applies only to hook and line fishing and the taking of minnows and smelt by means of dipnets, but minnows so taken shall not be sold, traded or bartered.

persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner or at any time in, on or along the following described water areas.

(4) Bayfield county. (a) Camp lake. That lake known as Camp lake located in section 20, township 44 north, range 8 west.

(b) Nancy lake. That lake known as Nancy lake located in section 6, township 45 north, range 8 west.

(c) Lamereau lake. That lake known as Lamereau lake located in section 6, township 45 north, range 8 west.

(13) Dane county. (a) University of Wisconsin arboretum. All springs, spring holes, streams, potholes and lagoons lying within the boundaries of the university of Wisconsin arboretum located in section 9, township 6 north, range 9 east, town of Madison, and in sections 26, 27, 28, 32, 33 and 35, township 7 north, range 9 east, town of Fitchburg.

(15) Door county. (a) Samuelsons creek. That stream known as Samuelsons creek from its mouth at the Sturgeon Bay ship canal upstream to its source.

(18) Eau Claire county. (a) Little Niagara creek. That stream known as little Niagara creek from its mouth at the Chippewa river upstream to its source, said stream flowing through and along Putnam park and the property of the university of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, all located within the city limits of the city of Eau Claire.

NR 26.12 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from April 51 to May 15 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

(59) Shawano county. (a) Wolf river. That part of the Wolf river located in the SW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 36, township 27 north, range 15 east starting at the Shawano Paper Mill dam and extending downstream to the Shawano county highway "M" bridge.

NR 26.13 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person or

persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill, or fish for fish in any manner from September 1 to December 31 in each year, both dates inclusive, in, on, or along the following described water areas:

(15) Door county. (a) Strawberry creek. That stream known as Strawberry creek in the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 16, township 27 north, range 26 east from the Sturgeon Bay ship canal upstream to its source.

(b) That portion of Sturgeon Bay from the north line of the Sturgeon Bay sewage disposal property on the south, north to the southwest slip of the Roen salvage company and extending lakeward to the bulkhead line.

NR 26.14 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill, or fish for fish in any manner from April 1 to April 30 in each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas.

(10) Clark county. (a) South fork Eau Claire river. That part of the south fork Eau Claire river beginning at the Mead Lake dam and extending downstream for a distance of 300 feet.

(24) Green Lake county. (a) Silver creek. That part of the Silver creek beginning at the Fond du Lac - Green Lake county line and extending downstream to the Spaulding bridge located in the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 23, township 16 north, range 13 east.

(39) Marquette county. (a) Montello river. That part of the Montello river beginning at the dam on the outlet of Lake Montello and extending downstream to the first bridge.

(b) Fox river. That part of the Fox river beginning at the dam in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 26, township 15 north, range 10 east and extending downstream a distance of 200 feet.

NR 26.15 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner or at any time except during the open season for muskellunge in, on or along the following described water areas:

(57) Sawyer county. (a) Chippewa river. Beginning at the gate of the reservoir dam known as the Winter dam in government lots 1 and 9 in section 2, township 39 north, range 6 west, and extending downstream 1,000 feet.

NR 26.16 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from April 15 to June 1 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

(7) Burnett county. (a) Clam river. That part of the Clam river beginning at the dam located in section 26, township 39 north, range 16 west, commonly known as the Clam lake dam, and extending downstream for a distance of 300 feet.

(57) Sawyer county. (a) Chief river. That part of the Chief river beginning at a point 200 feet upstream from the county trunk highway "B" bridge and extending upstream to the dam at the outlet of Callahan lake, all in sections 34 and 35, township 41 north, range 7 west.

(b) Chippewa river. Beginning at the gate of the reservoir dam known as the Winter dam in government lots 1 and 9 in section 2, township 39 north, range 6 west, and extending downstream 1,000 feet.

(c) Whitefish creek. The entire length of Whitefish creek from Whitefish lake to Lac Courte Oreilles, all lying in sections 11 and 12, township 39 north, range 9 west.

NR 26.17 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from February 15 to April 15 both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

(14) Dodge county. (a) Rock river (Hustisford dam). That part of the Rock river beginning at the Hustisford dam, in the village of Hustisford, and extending downstream for a distance of 725 feet.

NR 26.18 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from March 1 to April 15, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

(66) Washington county. (a) Milwaukee river (Newburg dam). That part of the Milwaukee river beginning at the Newburg dam in the town of Trenton and extending downstream for a distance of 300 feet.

NR 26.19 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from April 10 to May 10 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas.

(44) Oneida county. (a) Squirrel river. That part of the Squirrel river from the Squirrel lake dam in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 30, township 39 north, range 5 east, downstream from the said dam for a distance of 500 feet.

(64) Vilas county. (a) Helen creek. The entire length of stream from the point it enters Mamie lake in the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 20, township 43 north, range 9 east upstream to the stream source in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 31, township 43 north, range 9 east.

(b) Spring creek. That part of Spring creek from the point it enters Mamie lake in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 21, township 43 north, range 9 east upstream to the Spring lake outlet in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 27, township 43 north, range 9 east.

(c) Big Arbor Vitae lake. That part of Big Arbor Vitae lake beginning at the lake outlet in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 30, township 40 north, range 7 east, extending downstream for a distance of 500 feet.

(d) Little Arbor Vitae lake. That part of Little Arbor Vitae lake beginning at the lake outlet in the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 33, township 40 north, range 7 east extending downstream for a distance of 500 feet.

NR 26.20 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from April 10 to the date immediately preceding the opening date of the general fishing season of each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

(44) Oneida county. (a) Wisconsin river. That part of the Wisconsin river beginning from the Rainbow flowage dam, county highway "D", the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$, section 30, township 39 north, range 8 east, downstream from the said dam for a distance of 500 feet.

(b) Pelican river. That part of the Pelican river below the 5th lake dam of the Moen lake chain in the SE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 4, township 36 north, range 10 east and extending downstream from the said dam for a distance of 500 feet.

(c) Little Rice creek. That part of Little Rice creek below the Oneida lake dam in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 8 extending downstream to Hancock lake.

NR 26.21 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person or

persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from April 10 to May 20 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas.

(44) Oneida county. (a) Tomahawk river. That part of the Tomahawk river beginning from the Cedar Falls dam in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 27, township 38 north, range 5 east, downstream from the said dam for a distance of 500 feet.

NR 26.22 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from April 10 to May 15 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

(64) Vilas county. (a) Little St. Germain. That part of Little St. Germain beginning at the lake outlet in the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$, section 36, township 40 north, range 8 east extending downstream for a distance of 500 feet.

NR 26.23 Fish refuges. (1) In order to prevent substantial depletion of the fish supply, the following described spawning areas and nursery areas in Lake Superior are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner at any time in, on or along the following described water area: from the southernmost point of Outer Island in a straight line and a southerly direction to the Gull Island light and then south to the northernmost point of Michigan Island proceeding in a southerly direction following the shoreline of Michigan Island to the Michigan Island light, thence southerly to the center of the mouth of the Bad river in Ashland county; thence due east to the Michigan state line; thence northerly along the state line to a point due east of the southerly tip of Outer Island; from that point due west to the southernmost point of Outer Island, the place of beginning excluding those waters within one-half mile of the mainland

shoreline of Ashland county; all that area within these external boundaries wherein the lake bottom lies at a depth of 35 fathoms (210 feet) or less.

(2) In order to prevent substantial depletion of the fish supply, the following described spawning areas in Lake Superior are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from September 1 to November 15, both dates inclusive in, on or along the following described water areas:

(a) Sand Cut defined as an area bounded by a line extending from the Madeline Island bell buoy #2 due south to a point intersecting the shore of Long Island; thence due east to a point intersecting a line extending directly south from Big Bay Point; thence northward along that line to a point intersecting a line extending due east from the Madeline Island bell buoy #2; thence due west to Madeline Island bell buoy #2, the location of said buoy being 90°45" west by 46°45" north.

(b) Cat Island Shoal is defined as an area bounded by a line extending from the northernmost end of Cat Island easterly to the Outer Island Light; thence westerly to the northernmost end of North Twin Island; thence southwesterly to the northernmost end of Rocky Island; thence southeasterly to the north end of Cat Island, the place of beginning.

NR 26.24 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from March 1 to May 15 and September 1 to December 31 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas.

(15) Door county. (a) Ahnapee river. That portion of the Ahnapee river from the Forestville dam in section 29, township 26 north, range 25 east, downstream for a distance of 500 feet.

The foregoing rules were approved and adopted by the State of Wisconsin Natural Resources Board on June 17, 1976.

The rules contained herein shall take effect upon publication.
