## ORDER OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION REPEALING AND RECREATING RULES

- 1 To repeal PI 3.07(7)(a)8, 10 and 11 and recreate PI 3.07(7)(a)8 and to repeal
- 2 and recreate PI 3.07(14)(g) relating to certification requirements for library
- 3 media and instructional technology personnel.

## Analysis Prepared by the Department of Public Instruction

The proposed amendments to the Administrative Code relating to the library media and instructional technology certification rules are for clarification and implementation purposes. These amendments clarify the competencies to be developed in the education of those professionals responsible for selecting, evaluating, locating, organizing, interpreting, designing, and producing all types of instructional materials used in schools, for dealing with the related instructional equipment, and for instructing and assisting students and teachers in their effective use.

Four new licenses—Initial Instructional Library Media Specialist, Instructional Library Media Specialist, Instructional Technology Specialist, and Instructional Library Media Supervisor—will replace the pre-1986 School Librarian, School Library Supervisor, Audiovisual Coordinator, and Audiovisual Director licenses. Persons holding pre-1986 licenses may continue to serve with these licenses. This change is proposed to provide personnel prepared to administer and provide services in library media and instructional technology programs which have resulted from combining and expanding library and audiovisual programs in Wisconsin schools during the past 15 years.

The proposed amendments will assure that, in the school library media center of the future, students and teachers will work with professionals who understand the full range of library media and instructional technology, who are professional educators, and who know what makes an instructional tool effective. Secondly, they provide a visible structure for developing both building-level and district-level supervisory personnel.

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The DPI Certification Office issues approximately 6800 life licenses annually. Assuming that beginning in 1988 an additional 6800 five year licenses will be issued annually due to the elimination of life licenses, it can also be expected that the 6800 license base will continue to double every five years to account for the new recipients of five year licenses who also will not be able to receive life licenses, (e.g., every five years the number of licenses would increase as follows: in 1988 an additional 6,800, 1993 an additional 13,600, 1998 an additional 20, 400 and etc.). Over the next thirty to forty years this increase in five year licenses would gradually decrease until the holders of life licenses are nonexistent. The increase in state expenses from the issuance of more licenses annually would be balanced by the increase in state revenues. It is not possible at this time to determine how much costs would increase beginning in 1988.

There would be no fiscal impact on local school districts, but persons not possessing a life license would suffer a fiscal impact since they would be required to renew their license(s) every five years.
