ANALYSIS_BY_THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

The recent passage of 1987 Wisconsin Act 40 added to s. 343.06 (7), Stats., the requirement that the department of transportation define "reasonable control" in an administrative rule. This legislation also deleted sub. 343.06(6) and s. 343.09, Stats.; those provisions concerned the licensing of persons with epilepsy. The deletion of those provisions removes from state statute any express reference to epilepsy as a traffic safety issue. This rule defines "reasonable control" for some medical conditions or disorders. This rule establishes new standards for licensing persons having episodes of altered consciousness or loss of body control and removes from the administrative rule all references to epilepsy. The period in which a person must remain episode free is reduced from six to three months. The exceptions to the episode free requirement are deleted along with the requirement that an individual's license will generally be restricted for six to 24 months.

REGULATORY FLEXIBILITY ANALYSIS

This rule has no significant impact on small business.

FISCAL IMPACT

No fiscal impact is anticipated from the promulgation of these rule changes.

RULE TEXT

SECTION 1. Trans 108.01 (1) is amended to read:

Trans 108.01 PURPOSE AND SCOPE. (1) The purpose of this chapter is to establish the department's administrative

interpretation of ss. 343-09 343.06 (7), 343.13 and 343.16 (2), Stats., in relation to the issuance of motor vehicle operator licenses to persons who have experienced episodes involving altered consciousness,-or-convulsive-disorders-resulting-in altered-consciousness or loss of body control,-including-but-not limited-to-epilepsy.

SECTION 2. Trans 108.02 (2) to (9) are renumbered (3) to (10).

SECTION 3. Trans 108.02 (2) is created to read:

Trans 108.02 (2) "Basic driving needs" means a person's driving requirements for such purposes as traveling between that person's home and that person's doctor, place of employment, usual neighborhood shopping districts or other necessary destinations.

SECTION 4. Trans 108.02 (9) is amended to read:

Trans 108.02 (9) "Medical review board" or "review board" means a medical review board established under ss--343-09-(4)-and <u>s.</u> 343.16 (2), Stats.

SECTION 5. Trans 108.03(1)(c) 2. is amended to read:

Trans 108.03(1)(c)2. Knowledge of anticonvulsant medications episode medication and its effects.

SECTION 6. Trans 108.04 (1) is repealed.

SECTION 7. Trans 108.04 (2), (3) and (4) are renumbered 108.04 (1), (2) and (3) and as renumbered are amended to read:

Trans 108.04 MEDICAL REPORTS; FILING REQUIREMENTS. (1)

Persons <u>A person</u> who have <u>has</u> experienced only a single, nonrecurring episode and-meet-the-requirements-of-Trans 108.06(1)(c),-are <u>is</u> required to file <u>a</u> medical reports <u>report</u> every 6 months for 2 years since their <u>following that</u> single episode. To be eligible for the two year program, the medical report filed by a person's examining physician shall in writing state that the episode was an isolated occurrence and shall also state the following:

(a) The cause of the episode is identified;

(b) The physician believes that another episode is unlikely to occur;

(c) The physician is not treating and has not treated the person for the episode; and

(d) There is no previous history of any episode.

(2) Persons-who-are-not-subject-to <u>A person whose medical</u> report filed under sub. (1) or-(2) shows that the episode was not isolated, that treatment for the episode has been given, or that the person has a history of other episodes shall file medical reports every 6 months for 2 years and annual medical reports thereafter until 5 years have elapsed since their the last episode.

(3) In addition to the reporting requirements in subs. (1) to-(3) and (2), the department may require persons a person to file medical reports at other times when there is reason to believe medical information on file with the department is not current or complete.

SECTION 8. Trans 108.04 (5) and (6) are renumbered (4) and (5).

SECTION 9. Trans 108.05 (intro.) is amended to read:

Trans 108.05 EPISODE REPORTS. Whenever the department learns that an applicant or a licensee may have experienced an

episode, it shall require the person to file a medical report which has been filled out by the physician. The department shall review the medical report for the purpose of making-a determination-that determining whether:

SECTION 10. Trans 108.05 (1) is repealed.

SECTION 11. Trans 108.05 (2) to (5) are renumbered (1) to (4).

SECTION 12. Trans 108.05(1) as renumbered is amended to read:

Trans 108.05(1) The episode was the result of an identifiable neurologically related disorder,-but-an-affirmative diagnosis-of-epilepsy-has-not-been-made, and the person's licensing eligibility will be reviewed under this chapter; or

SECTION 13. Trans 108.06 is repealed and recreated to read:

Trans 108.06 <u>LICENSING DECISION.</u> (1) After the initial screening of the medical reports or physician information under s. Trans 108.05, the department shall take licensing action in accordance with the criteria prescribed in this chapter.

(2) Any person who has experienced an episode within the 3 month period immediately preceding the department's licensing action may not hold a license.

(3) (a) In this subsection, "reliable source" includes, but is not limited to, a police report or physician's report or a report from a parent or spouse.

(b) Whenever the department has evidence that an episode occurred within the preceding 3 months, the department shall take immediate licensing action based on that evidence. This action shall be taken whenever the following occurs:

1. The department receives information from a reliable source that the person has experienced an episode;

2. The information is substantiated by a second reliable source; and

3. The department has other evidence that there is a medical problem, including, but not limited to, a prior medical report, a report of an accident or a conviction that includes evidence of an episode.

(c) Whenever the department receives a medical report that shows the person has poor compliance, as described by the

person's physician, with the person's medical treatment program, the department shall take immediate licensing action based on that evidence.

SECTION 14. Trans 108.07 (1) (a) (intro.), (b) and (c) are amended to read:

Trans 108.07 <u>SPECIAL LICENSES</u>. (1) CHAUFFEUR'S LICENSES. (a) (intro.) A person who is episode free for more than 6 <u>3</u> months may be permitted to hold a restricted chauffeur <u>chauffeur's</u> license if the department determines from the eriteria <u>information listed</u> in s. Trans 108.03 that the person's condition is under control and <u>that</u> licensing does not present a substantial risk to the safety of that person or the general public, taking into account:

(b) Ehauffeur <u>Chauffeur's</u> licenses issued in accordance with par. (a) are-generally <u>shall be</u> restricted until the person is episode free for a-period-of 10 years, except that a person may be eligible for an unrestricted <u>chauffeur's</u> license if at least 2 years have elapsed since a single episode as specified <u>in under</u> s. Trans $\pm08-06-(\pm)-(e)$ <u>108.04(1)</u>.

(c) In-addition-to <u>In accord with</u> the criteria for restrictions established in par. (a), when a chauffeur <u>chauffeur's</u> license is issued to a person who has experienced an

episode it-will, the license shall be restricted so that the person may not transport passengers for hire, nor transport hazardous materials nor operate an authorized emergency vehicle except when \cdot :

1. Only a single episode as specified in s. Trans $\pm \theta \theta \cdot \theta \epsilon$ (\pm)-(e) <u>108.04 (1)</u> has been experienced and at least 2 years have elapsed since the episode, or

2. If not exempt by subd. 1., then only when the person:

a. Has not had an episode in the past 5 years; and

b. Has been-off-anticonvulsant <u>not taken</u> medication <u>for the</u> <u>episode</u> for 5 years.

SECTION 15. Trans 108.07 (2) is amended to read:

Trans 108.07 (2) MOTORCYCLE OPERATOR LICENSE. A person who is-otherwise the department finds qualified for licensing under s. Trans 108.06 (1)-to-(3) may hold an operator's license endorsed for operation of a motorcycle or may hold an operator's license restricted to operation of a motorcycle. Operator's license restrictions apply with equal force and effect to motorcycle operations. SECTION 16. Trans 108.07 (3) 1. and 2. a. and b. are renumbered 108.07 (3) (a) and (b) 1. and 2. and amended to read:

Trans 108.07 (3) (a) Only a single episode as specified in s. Trans $\pm \theta \theta \cdot \theta 6 - (\pm) - (e) \underline{108.04}$ (1) has been experienced and at least 2 years have elapsed since the episode; or

(b) If not exempt by $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{par.}{a}$, (a), then only when the person:

1. Has not had an episode in the past 5 years; and

2. Has been-off-anticonvulsant not taken medication for the episode for 5 years.

SECTION 17. Trans 108.08 is repealed and recreated to read:

Trans 108.08 <u>LICENSE RESTRICTIONS</u>. (1) Restrictions imposed under this chapter shall be in addition to any other restrictions, including corrective lenses restrictions, that may be required or appropriate under s. 343.13, Stats., or under other provisions of the law. (2) The department may restrict an operator's license, whenever the licensee's medical history shows any of the following:

(a) That the person's physician recommends restrictions; or

(b) That a medical review board recommends restrictions.

SECTION 18. Trans 108.10 (1) (a) is amended to read:

Trans 108.10 (1) (a) When the applicability <u>existence</u> of any of the conditions preseribed <u>described</u> in s. Trans 108.06 (1) (a)-through-(c)-are is at issue.

SECTION 19. Trans 108.10 (1) (b) is repealed.

SECTION 20. Trans 108.10 (1) (c), (d) and (e) are renumbered Trans 108.10 (1) (b), (c) and (d).

SECTION 21. Trans 108.10 (3) is amended to read:

Trans 108.10 (3) After receiving the recommendation of a medical review board, the department shall make its final licensing decision. Notice of the department's action shall be sent to the person affected within 10 working days after the person's appearance before the medical review board. The notice

shall include the medical review board's recommendations, and shall state the reasons for the recommendations and department's decision: and shall provide information on applicable review and appeal procedures.
