The statement of scope for this rule, SS 140-15, was approved by the Governor on December 17, 2015, Register No. 720B on December 28, 2015 and approved by the Natural Resources Board on January 27 permanent rule was approved by the Governor on March 7, 2017.

Statutory Authority and Explanation of Agency Authority: Related to the overnight placer stands on department managed lands, the agency is generally charged with the care, protection, supervision of state lands by s. 23.11 Stats. Under s. 23.09 (2) (d) related to conservation and clands, the agency is directed to provide an adequate and flexible system for the use of outdoor in this state and may promulgate such rules as are necessary.

The chapter on wild animals and plants, in s. 29.014, "rule making for this chapter", establishes department shall maintain open and closed seasons for fish and game and any limits, rest days, conditions for taking fish and game. This grant of rule-making authority allows the department establish the periods of time during the day when hunting is allowed.

Statutes Interpreted and Explanation: Related to the overnight placement of tree stands on managed lands, the agency is generally charged with the care, protection, and supervision of stable states. Hunters would be limited to the placement of two stands or blinds placed in a county.

Under these rules, unattended tree stands would need to be marked with the owner's departmer identification number or name and address. It would be illegal to cause damage to a tree, but c pruning of limbs less than 1 inch in diameter would not be considered causing damage to the tr stand is placed in. This would not permit cutting trees, brush and other vegetation for shooting

The department would survey hunter's opinions and evaluate concerns that are identified during period.

In statewide voting on a comparable advisory proposal at 2015 spring fish & wildlife hearings, supportive with results of Ayes, 1,814; Noes, 1,687. The county vote included 45 in support, 2 and a tie in one. For counties with area north of State Hwy 64, support was stronger and include support, 5 opposed, and a tie vote in one.

(5) shall apply states archer, crossbow and gun hunters pursuing any species, except migratory game birds listed in such that (1), during the period beginning on the Saturday preceding the Thanksgiving day holiday and of for 9 consecutive days in the central farmland and forest deer management zones established in 10.28 (4).

Note: The <u>shooting hours for</u> deer hunting with firearms hours do not apply to persons hunting corraccoon, or other wild animals for which no closed season has been established during the muzz season, an extended gun deer season or the extended gun season dates following the 9-day deer gun a metro deer management unit or in the southern farmland deer management zone.

- 2. On any land not part of the state park system, open to hunting and located north of stages Highway 64, portable tree stands and blinds may remain placed throughout the timeframe beging September 1 and ending January 31.
- 3. On any land that is part of the state park system, open to hunting, and located north Highway 64, portable tree stands and blinds may remain placed throughout the timeframe begin seven days prior to, and ending seven days after, an established fall hunting period.
- 4. Portable tree stands and blinds may be occupied and used while lawfully placed und 1. to 3.

SECTION 16. NR 45.09 (2) (b) is amended to read:

NR 45.09 (2) (b) Cause damage to trees by the placement or erection of portable tree s by any other manner while climbing or hunting from a tree. <u>Careful pruning</u>, flush with the tree, of limbs less than 1 inch in diameter on a tree in which a tree stand is used shall not be concausing damage to the tree.

SECTION 17. NR 45.09 (2) (d), (e) and (Note) are created to read:

NR 45.09 (2) (d) Place, use, or own an unoccupied tree stand unless the owner's depart customer identification number, or the owner's name and address, is written in the English lang attached to the tree stand in a manner so it is clearly visible to a person standing on the ground, legible at all times.

(e) Place more than two portable tree stands or blinds on department lands located in the county.

Note: Section NR 45.04 (3) (g) prohibits any person from destroying, molesting, possessing without permission, removing or attempting to remove the property of another.
