

An Act to provide for proof of pre-emptions in certain cases.

Chap 167

The people of the State of Wisconsin represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The commissioners for the sale of school and university lands, are hereby authorized to receive proof Authorized to receive proof. that pre-emptions to university lands had been previously granted in cases where records of the same have been lost, and upon proof of the same, and in reference thereto, to carry out the provisions of law relating to the sale of school and university lands.

An Act relating to the settlement of estates of deceased persons.

Chap 168

The people of the State of Wisconsin represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The judges of probate of the several counties in this state, or the person or persons who may by law exercise probate powers, are hereby authorized, when letters testamentary or of administration shall be granted, to receive, examine, and adjust all claims and demands of all persons against the deceased, and for this purpose are invested with all the powers and duties of the commissioners named in section one, (1,) of chapter seventy, of the revised statutes, and all the provisions of said chapter relating to the duties of commissioners shall regulate the duties of the judge of probate while performing the duties of such commissioner: *Provided however,* Provide. That if on the granting of letters testamentary or of administration, any person interested in said estate, either as creditor, heir, or legatee, shall require the appointing of commissioners, it shall be the duty of the judge of probate, or the person exercising probate powers, to appoint commissioners as provided in chapter seventy of the revised statutes.
