

academy rooms in the village of Whitewater, and shall hold their offices for the term of one year, and until their successors are duly elected. Each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote for the first share by him owned, and one vote for the next two shares, and one vote for every three shares thereafter. After the first election there shall be an annual meeting of the stockholders for the election of trustees, on the first Monday of March, at such place in said village as shall be designated by the trustees.

Annual meeting.

SEC. 5. The trustees shall have power to elect a president, secretary, and treasurer from their number, to fill vacancies in the board of trustees, to sell, lease, mortgage, or otherwise to dispose of any real or personal property of said corporation, in such manner as they shall deem most conducive to the interests of said academy, and to erect and keep in repair all necessary buildings for the use of the same, to prescribe and direct the course of study and discipline to be observed in said academy, and to make all rules, regulations, and by-laws, necessary to carry into effect the powers herein granted, and not inconsistent with the constitution and laws of this state.

An Act to incorporate the Troy Academy.

Chap. 41.

The people of the State of Wisconsin represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Hiram Medbury, Elias Hibbard, Isaiah W. Hibbard, Samuel Fowler, Daniel Hooper, George Hibbard, Augustus Smith, Chapman Craft, Garrett Winne, Hiram Brewster, and their associates, and such persons as may hereafter be associated with them, are hereby created a body corporate with perpetual succession, to be styled and designated the "Troy Academy," by which name they and their successors shall be known, and shall have power and be subject to sue and be sued, to contract and be contracted with, plead and be impleaded, in all courts of law or equity, and may acquire, purchase, receive, possess, hold, and enjoy property, real, personal, and mixed, and sell, convey, rent, or otherwise lawfully dispose of the same.

Create a body corporate.

Power to.

Seal.

SEC. 2. The said corporation may have a common seal which they may alter or renew at pleasure.

How organized.

SEC. 3. Any six of the above named persons may call a meeting of said association for the purpose of organizing, by publishing a notice of the time, place, and objects of such meeting, for two successive weeks, in the *Western Star*, and by posting up copies of such notice in three public places in the town of Troy, in the county of Walworth, in which town said meeting shall be held and said incorporation be located.

May elect trustees.

SEC. 4. At the first, or any subsequent legally notified meeting, the said persons above named and their associates, if a majority of them are present, shall have power to elect so many trustees and such officers as they may determine upon.

Object of corporation.

SEC. 5. The purpose of this incorporation is to provide for the education, mental and moral discipline, and instruction in literature, science and arts, of students in the said academy; and the said incorporation may make such rules, regulations, and by-laws, and vest in the said trustees and their successors, such powers as they may deem necessary to effect the said purposes, and which shall not be inconsistent therewith, or with law.

SEC. 6. This act may be amended or repealed by this, or any future legislature.
