

tion nineteen of said act as purports to repeal the acts and parts of acts conflicting with the provisions of said act or with the rights, privileges, and franchises thereby created, are hereby repealed.

SEC. 2. So much of section eight of the act to which this act is amendatory as authorizes the said LaCrosse and Milwaukee Rail Road Company to construct any branch rail road or rail roads, be and the same is hereby repealed. Further repealed

SEC. 3. Section twelve of the act to which this act is amendatory, is hereby repealed: *Provided*, That so much of said section as grants to the LaCrosse and Milwaukee Rail Road Company the right of way through lands belonging to the state of Wisconsin, is not repealed by this act. Further repealed

SEC. 4. All acts and parts of acts, and all charters granted to other rail road companies which purport to be repealed by the said act to which this act is amendatory, are hereby revived, restored, and declared to be in full force the same as if the said act to which this is amendatory had not become a law. Acts revived.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

An Act to vacate a part of a Territorial road in Green county, and to legalize a road laid out by the town board of supervisors of the town of Monroe in said county. Chap 488

*The people of the State of Wisconsin represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. That so much of the old territorial roads running north-westerly from Monroe village, as run across the corner of section thirty-four, in town two north, range seven east, be and are hereby vacated, and said roads are hereby declared to be established on the route of the alteration made by the town board of the town of Monroe, on the 4th of October, 1850. Road vacated.
