may give such damages, not exceeding \$5,000, as they shall deem fair and just in reference to the pecuniary injury resulting from such death to the relatives of the deceased specified in this section; Provided, Every such action shall be commenced within two years after the death of such deceased person.

AN ACT to change the time of holding the December Term of the Bupreme Court.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Time of holding BALY.

§ 1. A term of the Supreme Court shall hereafter be Supreme Court held, commencing on the Tuesday next preceding the second Wednesday of January in each year, and shall be called the January term.

> § 2. So much of any act or acts as requires a term of the Supreme Court to be held in the month of December of each year, is hereby repealed.

Hannah Jane Dutcher, a minor, now a resident devise and con- of Williamstown, Dodge county, State of Wisconsin, may hold, grant, bargain, sell, release, convey, devise and bequeath, real and personal property, and any right, title, interest and estate therein, and the rents, issues and profits thereof, in like manner, and with the like force and effect, as if she were of the full age of twenty-one years.

AN ACT to amend section three of chapter one hun-Ired and fifty-three [153] of Revised Statutes, and section one of chapter 12 Session Laws of 1854.

The peopls of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

§ 1. That so much of the provisions contained in Sec. 3, chapter 153 of Revised Statutes, and of section one of chapter 12 of Session Laws of 1854, as relates to the compensation of the keepers of the common jails of the various counties of this State, are hereby repealed, and such keepers shall be entitled to and shall receive such compensation for maintaining prisoners in said jails as shall be allowed by the Supervisors of such county, not less than two dollars and fifty cents per week.
