## CHAPTER 243.

[Published March 31, 1860.]

AN ACT to create the tewn of Forsyth, and to amend chapter 330, of the Private and Local Laws of 1857, incorporating the city of Berlin.

The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. All that portion of township 17, north of Town of For range number 13 east, which lies north and west of the syth organ-Fox River, in the county of Green Lake, including all that portion of the city of Berlin, which lies north and west of the Fox River, is hereby detached from the town and city of Berlin, and organized and declared to be a separate town, under the name and style of the town of Forsyth, with all the powers, rights and privileges conferred by law upon towns.

SEC. 2. From and after the passage of this act all con-Connection nection for municipal, corporate and city purposes, be-dissolved between the city and town of Berlin, and the territory tween terrihereby detached shall cease, and from and after that date the Fox River shall form and constitute the western and Boundary of northern boundary of said city of Berlin, from the points Berlin.

where the present northern and southern boundaries of said city intersect the Fox River.

SEC. 3. The city council or board of aldermen of said City of Berlin city of Berlin, are hereby authorized to select and apsupervisors in point two of their number to represent said city in the Co. board. county board of supervisors of Green Lake county, with all the powers of a chairman of the town board of supervisors, and all laws and parts of laws which provide other and different representation from said city, on said county board, are hereby repealed.

SEC. 4. The first election in said town of Forsyth, First election hereby created, shall be held on the first Tuesday in in town of April, A. D. 1860, at the hotel known as the "Barlow House" in said town, at which election such officers as

may be elected at general town meetings, shall be elected. SEC. 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from

and after its passage.
