CHAPTER 18.

[Published February 8, 1862.]

AN ACT to provide for the publication of the reports of the several state departments and state institutions.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

1,350 of each ret to be bound pamphlet

SECTION 1. Within ten days after the annual reports of the several state departments and institutions shall have been placed in the hands of the governor, he shall deliver them to the public printer, who shall immediately proceed to print twenty-seven hundred copies of each of said reports, one-half of which shall be folded and stitched in pamphlet form, three hundred for the use of the institution or department making the same, and the remainder shall be laid before the legislature at the commencement of the ensuing session, 1,360 of each, to- for the use of the members. The remaining thirteen ps, to be bound hundred and fifty copies of each of said reports, together with the annual message of the governor, shall be bound into thirteen hundred and fifty volumes, each containing one of each of said reports and message, and shall be delivered to the superintendent of public property within one month after the commencement of the legislature, who shall retain fifty copies for the use of the state departments, one hundred and fifty copies for the use of the next succeeding legislature, and lay the remainder before the legislature then in session.

Repeal.

Section 2. So much of any act as requires the printing of the reports of any of the state departments or public institutions, in any greater or less number, or in any other form than that required by this act, is hereby repealed.

This.

Section 3. Chapter 104 of the general laws of 1861, entitled "an act in relation to printing reports for the use of the senate and assembly, by the officers of the several departments and superintendents of state institutions," and so much of any act as conflicts with the provisions of this act, is hereby repealed.

Section 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
