CHAPTER 193.

[Published April 4, 1862.]

AN ACT to amend chapter 176 of the private and local [general] laws of 1860, entitled "an act to incorporate the village of Mauston."

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. That section [sections] twenty-three and Application for twenty-four be stricken out, and the following inserted ments. in their stead : "Whenever two-thirds of all the owners of real estate, bounding one side of any street or part of street, not less than ten rods in length, residing in the village, shall desire to have a sidewalk built or repaired, they shall make an application in writing to the trustees of said village, specifying in such application the sum necessary to be raised for that purpose; and if a majority of the trustees shall deem said improvement necessary, they shall levy and cause to be collected such sum by tax on the owners of real estate adjoining said street or part of street, on the side on which said improvement is located. Said tax shall be collected on the last assessment valuation of the real estate and lots, as the same shall appear on the assessment roll of said village."

SECTION 2. Amend section thirty by striking out Levy and collecall after the word "respectively" in the sixth line of tax. said section, and insert [inserting] the following, so that the section, when amended, will read as follows: "When such assessment roll shall be finally completed, the trustees shall cause to be levied such amount of tax as shall have been determined to have been raised, and shall set opposite to each description and valuation of taxable property, the amount of tax charged upon such property, and to each person respectively; which said tax shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as state and county taxes are now collected."

SECTION 3. Strike out all of sections thirty-one, Bepeal. thirty-two, thirty-three, thirty-four, thirty-five, thirtysix, thirty-seven, thirty-eight, thirty-nine and forty. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
