plaintiff shall in such case have judgment for the amount so found due, with costs as in ordinary civil actions, but he shall not recover the costs of executing such attachment.

CHAPTER 471.

AN ACT to prohibit the catching for sale or offering for sale or barter, any brook trout caught in any of the streams, ponds or lakes of the state.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Any person who shall catch for sale Trout law or offer for sale or barter, any brook trout caught in any of the streams, ponds or lakes of this state, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punishable by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars, and upon conviction for a second violation of the provisions of this act, shall be punishable by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than twenty dollars; provided, that this act shall not prohibit the catching for sale or barter, brook trout, raised and propagated in any of the private streams or ponds of the state by the owners thereof, or their agents; provided, however, that the provisions of this act shall not extend to or affect the counties of Ashland, Bayfield, Douglas, Polk, Pierce or Burnett.

SECTION 2. Upon complaint made before any magistrate or justice of the peace charging the commission of an offense against the provisions of this act in his county, it shall be the duty of the district attorney of any such county to prosecute the offender.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication. Approved April 13, 1885.
