of this act, or knowingly make any false certificate in respect to such duty, or to any matter to which he may be required by law to officially certify, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding nine menths, or by fine of not more than five hundred dollars.

Section 33. All acts and parts of acts conflicting with any provisions of this act are repealed in so far as they are inconsistent therewith.

Section 34. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

## CHAPTER 392.

AN ACT to appropriate a certain sum of money for the purchase of stationery for the use of the state.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. There is appropriated out of any money in the general fund not otherwise appropriated the sum of seventeen thousand dollars, for the purchase of stationery for state officers and departments, for the years 1911 and 1912 and for the legislative session of 1913, said sum being the amount estimated to be necessary for the purposes specified.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

## CHAPTER 393.

AN ACT to create section 4595d of the statutes, in reference to works of necessity or charity.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. There is added to the statutes a new section to read: Section 4959d. The keeping open of a store or shop for the sale of dry goods, wearing apparel, hats, caps, hoots, shoes, hardware, furniture, crockery, glassware, jewelry, groceries, coffees, teas, spices, meats or meat products on the first day of the week, shall not be deemed a work of necessity or charity.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
