CHAPTER 18

AN ACT relating to the validity of bonds issued by cities for any purpose.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. If the electors of any city, prior to the passage of this act, shall have voted in favor of issuing bonds for any purpose or purposes, and the vote on such bonds shall be invalid by reason of the failure or neglect of the city to print on the ballot by which the proposition of issuing said bonds was submitted to the electors a statement of the amount of bonds theretofore issued by such city for said purpose or purposes and then outstanding, as required by section 943e of the statutes, the common council of such city may, notwithstanding such failure or neglect, authorize the issuance of said bonds and when issued, they shall be valid, legal and binding, and of the same force and effect as though said section 943e of the statutes had been fully complied with.

Section 2. All acts or parts of acts insofar as they contravene the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.

CHAPTER 19

AN ACT to create subsection 5 of section 1917 of the statutes, relating to the revocation of insurance company's license.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. There is added to section 1917 of the statutes a new subsection to read: (Section 1917) 5. If an insurance company shall hold a certificate of authority to transact more than one kind of insurance, the commissioner shall have power to annul or revoke such certificate as to one or more kinds of insurance authorized therein for the same cause and in the same manner that he is authorized to annul or revoke such certificate for all kinds of insurance authorized therein.

Section 2. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.
