VE 2.01 Definition. "Board" means the Veterinary Examining Board. History: Cr. Register, November, 1961, No. 71, eff. 12-1-61; am. Regter, August, 1972, No. 200, eff. 9-1-72.

VE 2.02 Age; examination. No person shall be granted a license to practice veterinary medicine unless he has attained the age of 18 years and has successfully passed an examination conducted by the board.

VE 2.03 Educational qualifications. Applicants for license shall submit proof of graduation from a school of veterinary medicine. Schools in the United States and Canada, approved by the American Veterinary Medical Association are approved by the board. Graduates of schools outside the United States and Canada are required to pass the E.C.F.V.G. test of the American Veterinary Medical Association as a pre-requisite to eligibility for examination; and to have the school from which the applicant is graduated furnish to the board a copy of its curriculum in English. The curriculum must be equal to American Veterinary Medical Association standards; determination to be made by the board. Temporary permits may be issued by the board, but only to graduates of schools in the United States and Canada.

VE 2.04 License; application. Application for license shall be made on forms prescribed by the board and shall be accompanied by:

(1) The examination fee. After notification that the application has been accepted, failure to appear at the examinations shall render the applicant ineligible for examination except upon reapplication accompanied by additional fees.

(2) Scores of the National Board Examination, furnished by the Interstate Reporting Service. The National Board Examination may be given by the Wisconsin Veterinary Examining Board to the applicants as a convenience on a cost basis.

(3) The fee for the original license.

VE 2.05 License; fee. No license or renewal of license shall be issued except upon payment of the annual fee.

VE 2.06 License; failure to renew. Any person who fails to renew his license annually may be required to pass an examination before a license will be issued.

VE 2.07 License; revoked or suspended. If a license is revoked or suspended, no part of the license fee shall be refunded.

VE 2.08 Temporary permit. (1) A graduate of a veterinary college approved by the board who meets all requirements for examination may be granted a permit to practice veterinary medicine until the next examination is given provided he is employed and supervised by a licensed veterinarian. Applicants for such temporary permit must provide:

(a) Proof of graduation

(b) Permit fee of \$25

(c) Three letters of recommendation

(d) Letter from the licensed veterinarian agreeing to employ and supervise applicant.

(2) The applicant must personally appear before the board in order to obtain such temporary permit.

(3) Permits shall not be extended beyond the examination date nor granted to candidates for license who have once failed the examination.

VE 2.09 Examination for licensure. The examination will consist of 6 parts, one part being the national board examination and one part

6 parts, one part being the national board examination and one part by each of the 5 professional members of the board. The part prepared by the individual board member will consist of both a written and an oral-practical examination.

(1) National board score shall be reported by a percentage score.

(2) The board members shall report one score which shall be arrived at by scoring 20% for national board, 40% for written portion, and 40% for oral practical portion.

(3) A score of 70% or better is needed from 3 of the examiners before a license will be issued.
