## Chapter NR 26

## FISH REFUGES

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(Section 23.09, Stats.)

Note: Ch. NR 26 as it existed on December 31, 1976, was repealed and a new ch. NR 26 was created effective January 1, 1977.

NR 26.01 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner or at any time in, on or along the following described water areas.

- (9) CHIPPEWA COUNTY. (a) That part of the Chippewa river from the Jim Falls dam located in section 29, T30N, R7W, and extending downstream for a distance of 1,000 feet.
- (11) COLUMBIA COUNTY. (a) Lake Columbia. Those portions of the lake known as Lake Columbia located in sections 27, 33 and 34, township 12 north, range 9 east, and sections 3 and 4, township 11 north, range 9 east, beginning at the intake and outfall structures of the columbia generating station and extending 2400 feet due south.
- (b) Lake Wyona. That lake known as Lake Wyona including the dam located in the village of Wyocena upstream to the East Bush road on the inflowing north branch of Duck creek, section 14, township 12 north, range 10 east and upstream to the dam at "Figor's millpond" upstream from Twitchell road, section 23, township 12 north, range 10 east on the middle branch of Duck creek. This refuge is to remain in effect to, but not including the first Saturday in May, 1985.
- (c) Park lake. Park lake located in sections 2 and 3, township 12 north, range 10 east, town of Wyocena, except when posted "open to fishing" by the department. This refuge is in effect only until Janaury 1, 1989.
- (13) Dane county. (a) *University of Wisconsin arboretum*. All springs, spring holes, streams, potholes and lagoons lying within the boundaries of the university of Wisconsin arboretum located in section 9, township 6 north, range 9 east, town of Madison, and in sections 26, 27, 28, 32, 33 and 35, township 7 north, range 9 east, town of Fitchburg.
- (15) Door county. (a) Samuelsons creek. That stream known as Samuelsons creek from its mouth at the Sturgeon Bay ship canal upstream to its source.

- (18) EAU CLAIRE COUNTY. (a) Little Niagara creek. That stream known as little Niagara creek from its mouth at the Chippewa river upstream to its source, said stream flowing through and along Putnam park and the property of the university of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, all located within the city limits of the city of Eau Claire.
- (26) IRON COUNTY. (a) Flambeau river. That part of the Flambeau river located in the SW¼ of the SE¼ and SE¼ of the SW¼ of section 34, township 42 north, range 2 east, and the NE¼ of the NW¼ and the NW¼ of the NE¼ of section 3, township 41 north, range 2 east, beginning at the dam in and across the Flambeau river in section 34, township 42 north, range 2 east, commonly known as the Turtle-Flambeau dam and extending downstream from said dam to the U.S. government gaging station of said river in the NE¼ of the NW¼ of said section 3.
- (31) Kewaunee county. (a) Flume of the Kewaunee nuclear power plant.
- (33) LAFAYETTE COUNTY. (a) Yellowstone lake. That lake known as Yellowstone lake including the water from the Yellowstone lake dam located in E½ SE¼, section 1, township 3 north, range 4 east upstream to the CTH F bridge crossing the Yellowstone river in NW¼ SW¼, section 35, township 4 north, range 4 east and the CTH F bridge on Steiner branch creek in NE¼ SE¼, section 34, township 4 north, range 4 east, Lafayette county. This refuge is to remain in effect through June 14, 1985.
- (36) Manitowoc county. (a) Flume of the Point Beach nuclear power plant.
- (39) MARQUETTE COUNTY. (a) Fredreck creek. That part of Fredreck creek beginning at the downstream side of the bridge on the fish hatchery road and thence upstream to its headwaters, said part of stream lying in sections 1 and 12, township 16 north, range 8 east.
- (b) Grand river. That part of the Grand river beginning at the Grand River wildlife dam located in the NW¼ of the NW¼ of section 1, township 14 north, range 10 east and extending downstream a distance of 50 feet.
- (51) PRICE COUNTY. North Fork, Flambeau river. That part of the Flambeau river from Upper Park Falls dam downstream to the state highway 182 bridge.
- (57) SAWYER COUNTY. (a) Chippewa river (west fork). That part of the west fork of the Chippewa river beginning at the Moose Lake dam located in section 14, township 41 north, range 6 west, and thence downstream for a distance of 500 feet.
- (b) Spider creek. That part of the Spider creek beginning at the Little Spider lake dam (NE¼ SE¼, sec. 33, T42N, R7W) downstream to state hwy. 77 (SW¼ SE¼, sec 33, T42N, R7W).
- (63) VILAS COUNTY. (a) *Manitowish river*. Beginning at the dam in and across the Manitowish river, located in section 9, township 42 north, range 5 east, commonly known as the Rest Lake dam, and thence downstream from the said dam for a distance of 500 feet.

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- (b) *Rice creek*. All that part of Rice creek in sections 4, 8 and 9, township 42 north, range 6 east, beginning at Newcomb's Point in section 8 and extending upstream to the outlet of Big lake in section 4.
- (c) Trilby lake. That lake known as Trilby lake (camp 7) located in sections 11, 12, 13 and 14, township 40 north, range 6 east.
- (67) WAUKESHA COUNTY. (a) Scuppernong springs. All waters of the Scuppernong spring, Scuppernong creek and Scuppernong river located in that part of the SW¼ of the NE¼ lying south of state trunk highway 67 and east of county trunk highway ZZ; that part of the NE¼ of the SE½ lying south and west of state trunk highway 67; that part of the NW¼ of the SE¼ lying south of state trunk highway 67 and east of county trunk highway ZZ; the N½ of the SW¼ of the SE¼ that part of the SE¼ of the SE½ lying west of state trunk highway 67; all lying in section 34, township 6 north, range 17 east, town of Ottawa.

NR 26.02 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, catch, disturb, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from January 1 to May 1 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

- (17) DUNN COUNTY. (a) RED CEDAR RIVER. That part of the Red Cedar river beginning at the Cedar Falls dam located in section 6, township 28 north, range 12 west, and extending downstream 4,300 feet; also, that part of the Red Cedar river lying entirely in section 14, township 29 north, range 12 west.
- (70) WINNEBAGO COUNTY. (a) FOX RIVER (EUREKA DAM). Beginning at the dam in and across the Fox river, located in section 31, township 18 north, range 14 east, commonly known as the Eureka dam, and thence downstream from the said dam for 500 feet.

NR 26.03 Fish refuges. The following described area is hereby created and established as a fish refuge, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, catch, disturb, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner or at any time in, on or along the following described water areas throughout the open season for hunting migratory waterfowl each year.

(29) Juneau county. (a) Meadow Valley flowage. That part of the Meadow Valley flowage beginning at a point in the E½ of section 10, township 20 north, range 2 east, where the drainage ditch intersects the Meadow Valley flowage road; thence northerly along the east spoil bank of said ditch to the junction of a brushed line at the approximate interior quarter corner of section 3, township 20 north, range 2 east; thence west along said brushed line to its junction with the east-west drainage ditch; thence westerly along the north spoil bank of said ditch to its junction with the main north-south drainage ditch; thence south along the west spoil bank of said ditch to its point of intersection with the Meadow Val-

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ley flowage road; thence east along said Meadow Valley road to the point of beginning.

NR 26.04 Fish refuges. The following areas are fish refuges, and no person may take, catch, disturb, capture, kill, or fish for fish in any manner from April 25 to May 14 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along them:

(55) Rusk county. Thornapple river. That portion of the Thornapple river from its confluence with the Chippewa river in section 4, T34N, R7W upstream to the Thornapple road crossing in section 33, T35N, R1W.

NR 26.05 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, catch, disturb, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from April 1 to the date immediately preceding the opening date of the general fishing season of each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

- (51) PRICE COUNTY. (b) Solberg creek. Solberg creek commmonly known as Disappearing creek in section 20, township 38 north, range 1 east beginning at the dyke (road crossing) and extending 200 feet upstream.
- (c) Squaw creek. Beginning at the bridge in section 16, township 38 north, range 1 west, then extending 300 feet upstream and 300 feet downstream.

NR 26.06 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, catch, disturb, capture, kill, or fish for fish in any manner from April 1 to May 14 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

- (26) Iron county. (a) Gile flowage. 1. Junk Shop dike. 200 feet on either side of the Junk Shop dike on Knight road where it crosses the flowage between section 36, township 46 north, range 2 east, and section 1, township 45 north, range 2 east.
- 2. County trunk highway C. 200 feet on either side of that part of county trunk highway C located in the SW¼ of the NW¼, and in the NW¼of the SW¼, section 1, township 45 north, range 2 east.
- (b) *Turtle river*. Beginning at the dam in and across the Turtle river located in section 6, township 42 north, range 3 east, commonly known as Lake of the Falls dam and thence downstream 1,000 feet.
- (c) Mercer creek. That part of Mercer creek located between Mercer and Grand Portage lakes in section 36, township 43 north, range 3 east.
- (d) Fisher and Catherine lakes. That part of the inlet and outlets connecting Fisher and Catherine lakes (sec. 2, T43N, R4E) for a distance of approximately 200 feet on either side of the road and culvert.

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- (h) Turtle creek. That part of Turtle creek (Upper Turtle lake outlet) in the NE% of the NW%, section 27, township 34 north, range 14 west, downstream for a distance of 300 feet and from the outlet of Lower Turtle lake in the SE% of the SW%, section 27, upstream for a distance of 300 feet.
- (4) BAYFIELD COUNTY. (a) *Pikes creek*. That part of Pikes creek from the structure commonly known as Red dam extending downstream 100 feet, all in section 28, township 50 north, range 4 west.
- (49) POLK COUNTY. (a) Balsam branch. That part of Balsam branch from Wapogasset lake in the NE% of the NW%, section 14, township 33 north, range 17 west upstream to the dam at Kennedy's Mill in the SE% of the SE%, section 10, township 33 north, range 17 west.
- (b) Butternut creek. That part of Butternut creek between Big Butternut lake and Little Butternut lake, Luck township.
- (c) *Harder creek*. That part of Harder creek between Balsam lake and Half Moon lake, Milltown township.
- (d) Horse creek. That part of Horse creek in the NW¼ of the SE¼, section 27, township 32 north, range 18 west (Cedar lake inlet) upstream for a distance of 1000 feet.
- (e) Sucker creek. That part of Sucker creek beginning at the outlet of Lake Wapogasset and extending downstream to the county trunk highway "F" bridge, all in section 26, township 33 north, range 17 west.
- (54) Rusk county. (a) That part of Swift creek between Island Lake dam and 500 feet below the dam.
- (57) Sawyer county. (a) That part of the Brunet river between Lake Winter dam and 500 feet below the dam.
- (b) That part of the Couderay river between Radisson dam and 500 feet below the dam.
- (c) That part of the Chippewa river from the Arpin dam located in section 23, T38N, R7W and extending downstream for a distance of 500 feet.

- NR 26.10 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from July 15 to October 31 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:
- (16) DOUGLAS COUNTY. (a) Brule river. That part of the Brule river commonly known as the Box Car Hole, extending downstream from the Box Car Hole 100 feet and extending upstream from the Box Car Hole 100 feet, all located in section 2, township 47 north, range 10 west.

NR 26.11 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any

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manner from September 1 to May 31, each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

(4) BAYFIELD COUNTY. (a) Sioux river. That part of the Sioux river commonly known as the Big Rock Hole extending downstream for a distance of 200 feet all in section 19, township 49 north, range 4 west.

- NR 26.12 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from April 15 to May 15 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:
- (4) BAYFIELD COUNTY. (a) Eau Claire Chain of Lakes. That part of the Eau Claire river system connecting the Eau Claire Chain of Lakes in Barnes township.
- (59) SHAWANO COUNTY. (a) Wolf river. That part of the Wolf river located in the SW¼, section 36, township 27 north, range 15 east starting at the Shawano Paper Mill dam and extending downstream to the Shawano county highway "M" bridge.

- (15) DOOR COUNTY. (a) Strawberry creek. That stream known as Strawberry creek in the SE¼ of the SE¼, section 16, township 27 north, range 26 east from the Sturgeon Bay ship canal upstream to its source.
- (c) That portion of the Sturgeon Bay ship canal within 500 feet of Strawberry creek in the SE¼ of the SE¼, section 16, township 22 north, range 26 east.

- (10) CLARK COUNTY. (a) South fork Eau Claire river. That part of the south fork Eau Claire river beginning at the Mead Lake dam and extending downstream for a distance of 300 feet.

or at any time except during the open season for muskellunge in, on or along the following described water areas:

(54) RUSK COUNTY. (a) Flambeau river. That part of the Flambeau river within 200 feet of all hydroelectric dams.

- NR 26.16 Fish refuges. - (7) BURNETT COUNTY. (a) Clam river. That part of the Clam river beginning at the dam located in section 26, township 39 north, range 16 west, commonly known as the Clam lake dam, and extending downstream for a distance of 300 feet.
- (57) SAWYER COUNTY. (a) Chief river. That part of the Chief river beginning at a point 200 feet upstream from the county trunk highway "B" bridge and extending upstream to the dam at the outlet of Callahan lake, all in sections 34 and 35, township 41 north, range 7 west.
- (b) Chippewa river. Beginning at the gate of the reservoir dam known as the Winter dam in government lots 1 and 9 in section 2, township 39 north, range 6 west, and extending downstream 1,000 feet.
- (c) Whitefish creek. The entire length of Whitefish creek from Whitefish lake to Lac Courte Oreilles, all lying in sections 11 and 12, township 39 north, range 9 west.

The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from March 1 to April 15, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:

(66) WASHINGTON COUNTY. (a) Milwaukee river (Newburg dam). That part of the Milwaukee river beginning at the Newburg dam in the town of Trenton and extending downstream for a distance of 300 feet.

NR 26.19 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any Register, January, 1989, No. 397

- (44) ONEIDA COUNTY. (a) Squirrel river. That part of the Squirrel river from the Squirrel lake dam in the NW¼ of the NE¼, section 30, township 39 north, range 5 east, downstream from the said dam for a distance of 500 feet.
- (64) VILAS COUNTY. (a) Helen creek. The entire length of stream from the point it enters Mamie lake in the SE¼ of the NW¼, section 20, township 43 north, range 9 east upstream to the stream source in the NW¼ of the SW¼, section 31, township 43 north, range 9 east.
- (b) Spring creek. That part of Spring creek from the point it enters Mamie lake in the NE¼ of the SW¼, section 21, township 43 north, range 9 east upstream to the Spring lake outlet in the NE¼ of the NW¼, section 27, township 43 north, range 9 east.
- (c) Big Arbor Vitae lake. That part of Big Arbor Vitae lake beginning at the lake outlet in the NE¼ of the SE¼, section 30, township 40 north, range 7 east, extending downstream for a distance of 500 feet.
- (d) Little Arbor Vitae lake. That part of Little Arbor Vitae lake beginning at the lake outlet in the NW% of the SW%, section 33, township 40 north, range 7 east extending downstream for a distance of 500 feet.

- NR 26.20 Fish refuges. - (44) ONEIDA COUNTY. (a) Wisconsin river. That part of the Wisconsin river beginning from the Rainbow flowage dam, county highway "D", the SW¼ of the SW¼, section 30, township 39 north, range 8 east, downstream from the said dam for a distance of 500 feet.
- (b) Pelican river. That part of the Pelican river below the 5th lake dam of the Moen lake chain in the SE¼, section 4, township 36 north, range 10 east and extending downstream from the said dam for a distance of 500 feet.
- (c) Little Rice creek. That part of Little Rice creek below the Oneida lake dam in the NE% of the NE%, section 8 extending downstream to Hancock lake.

- (44) ONEIDA COUNTY. (a) *Tomahawk river*. That part of the Tomahawk river beginning from the Cedar Falls dam in the NE¼ of the NE¼, sec-Register, January, 1989, No. 397

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tion 27, township 38 north, range 5 east, downstream from the said dam for a distance of 500 feet.


- NR 26.22 Fish refuges. The following described areas are hereby created and established as fish refuges and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, disturb, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner from April 10 to May 15 each year, both dates inclusive, in, on or along the following described water areas:
- (64) VILAS COUNTY. (a) Little St. Germain. That part of Little St. Germain beginning at the lake outlet in the SW¼ of the SE¼, section 36, township 40 north, range 8 east extending downstream for a distance of 500 feet.

- NR 26.23 Fish refuges. (1) In order to prevent substantial depletion of the fish supply, the following described spawning areas and nursery areas in Lake Superior are hereby created and established as fish refuges and no person may take, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner at any one time in, on or along the following described water areas:
- (a) From the southernmost point of Outer island in a straight line and a southerly direction to the Gull island light and then south to the northernmost point of Michigan island proceeding in a southerly direction following the shoreline of Michigan island to the Michigan island light, then southerly towards the center of the mouth of the Bad river in Ashland county to latitude 46°41'; then due east to the Michigan state line; then northerly along the state line to a point due east of the southerly tip of Outer island; from that point due west to the southernmost point of Outer island, the place of beginning excluding those waters within 2 miles of Outer island and within one mile of the mainland shoreline of Ashland county: except that licensed commercial fishers may fish all that area within these external boundaries wherein the lake bottom lies at a depth of 35 fathoms (210 feet) or more; and, except in those included waters less than 7 fathoms in depth which immediately adjoin Michigan island, gill nets with a mesh size of 2\%" or less stretch measure may be used from November 5 to December 5 for the taking of Menominee whitefish.
- (b) All waters wherein the bottom lies at a depth of less than 35 fathoms northerly from a line beginning 2 miles north of the Outer island light and extending westerly to the north end of North Twin island, then along the shoreline to the south end of North Twin island, then southwesterly to the north end of South Twin island, then northerly to the north end of Rocky island, then along the north shoreline to the northwest point of Rocky island, then northwesterly to the south end of Devils island, then westerly to a point 2½ miles north of the York Island Shoal bell buoy.
- (2) In order to prevent substantial depletion of the fish supply, the following described spawning area in Lake Superior is hereby created and established as a fish refuge and no person may take, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner in, on or along the following described area during the prescribed period, both dates inclusive:

- (a) Cat Island Shoal is defined as all waters bounded by a line extending from a point 2 miles north of the Outer island light to the northern end of North Twin island, along the shoreline to the southernmost end of North Twin island, then southwest to the north end of South Twin island, along the shoreline to the southernmost end of South Twin island, then easterly to the north end of Cat island, then along the shoreline to the easternmost point of Cat island, then northeasterly to the Outer island light, then due north to the place of beginning, September 1 to November 28.
- (3) In order the prevent substantial depletion of the fish supply, the following described area in Lake Michigan is established as a fish refuge and no person may take, catch, capture, kill or fish for fish in any manner at any time in or on the following described water area: all waters bounded by a line beginning at the point where 43°7' north latitude and 87°40' west longitude intersect, then proceeding northerly along 87°40' west longitude to its intersection with 43°20' north latitude, then proceeding easterly along 43°20' north latitude to its intersection with 87°20' west longitude, then proceeding northerly along 87°20' west longitude to its intersection with 43°30' north latitude, then proceeding easterly along 43°30' north latitude to its intersection with the Wisconsin-Michigan state line, then proceeding southerly along the Wisconsin-Michigan state line to its intersection with 43° north latitude, then proceeding westerly along 43° north latitude to its intersection with 87°14′ west longitude, then proceeding northerly along 87°14' west longitude to its intersection with 43°3' north latitude, then proceeding westerly along 43°3' north latitude to its intersection with 87°18' west longitude, then proceeding southerly along 87°18' west longitude to its intersection with 43° north latitude, then proceeding westerly along 43° north latitude to its intersection with 87°23' west longitude, then proceeding along a straight line northwesterly to its intersection with 43°7' north latitude and 87°30' west longitude, then proceeding westerly along 43°7' north latitude to its intersection with 87°40' west longitude and the point of beginning. This area can be further described as the northern third of grid 1903, the northeastern two thirds of grid 1904 and all of grid 1905 except a rectangular area along its southern border; all of grids 1705, 1803, 1804 and 1805; and the part of grids 1706, 1806 and 1906 in Wisconsin waters, and encompasses the elevated areas of lake bed commonly known as the Sheboygan reef, the Northeast reef, the Milwaukee reef and the East reef as shown on the following map.
