

ORDER OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN NATURAL RESOURCES BOARD REPEALING, AMENDING,
RENUMBERING, REPEALING AND RECREATING AND CREATING RULES

The Wisconsin Natural Resources Board proposes an order to repeal s. NR 10.29(2) and 11.08; to amend s. NR 10.01(1)(g)1.L. and m., (2)(f)2., (3)(e)3.c., d., e., (em)1., (es)1., (4)(a)1., (c)1., 2. and 3., (d), (dm), (e)1., 2., 4., and 5., 10.102(4), 10.106(11), and 10.27(2), (5)(intro.), (6), (7) and (8)(a); to renumber s. NR 10.01(3)(e)3.cm. and 15.024(4); to repeal and recreate s. NR 10.29(2); and to create s. NR 10.01(3)(e)3.cr., f., g. and (es), and 15.024(intro.) and (a) relating to hunting and trapping regulation changes.

Analysis Prepared by the Department of Natural Resources

Statutory Authority: Statutes that authorize the promulgation of this rule order include sections 29.014, and 227.11, Stats. These sections grant rule making authority to the department to establish and maintain open and closed seasons for hunting and that all rules promulgated under this authority are subject to review under ch. 227, Stats. In addition, s. 29.089(3), Stats., authorizes the department to promulgate rules that allow hunting on state park properties.

Statutes Interpreted: In promulgating this rule, s. 29.164(2), Stats., relating to the department's authority to regulate turkey hunting, s. 29.184(2), Stats., relating to bear management, and s. 29.192(2), Stats., relating to sharp-tailed grouse management, have been interpreted as allowing the department the authority to create turkey management zones, modify the deadline for purchase of a Class A bear permit, and eliminate closed areas for sharp-tailed grouse.

Plain Language Rule Analysis: This rule package repeals the prohibition on Canada goose hunting on the Saturday, Sunday and Monday of the Labor Day holiday weekend. Extends the Fall turkey season to 40 consecutive days by opening the season on October 1. Clarifies that Willow River and Kinnickinnic state parks have a 9-day deer gun season. Clarifies the muzzleloader and firearm seasons at the Loew Lake unit of the Kettle Moraine state forest. Extends the muzzleloader deer season to 10 days in state parks where the muzzleloader season is offered to be consistent with the statewide muzzleloader deer season. Creates a 9-day deer gun season at Governor Thompson state park. Differentiates between the early and late archery deer seasons. Modifies the muskrat, fisher and mink seasons to provide consistency in season dates and lengthens the seasons for these species. Modifies the beaver and otter trapping seasons to provide consistency in season dates. It also lengthens the otter trapping season for reduced incidental take and shortens the beaver trapping season for population management control. Extends the deadline for purchasing a class A bear hunting license. Allows legally harvested deer to be skinned prior to registration. Extends the late archery season in state parks where late archery deer hunting is allowed to be consistent with the statewide late archery season. Creates three new turkey management zones. Eliminates sharp-tailed grouse closed areas in northwestern Wisconsin.

Federal Regulatory Analysis: Provided state rules and statutes do not relieve individuals from the restrictions, requirements and conditions of Federal statutes and regulations, regulation of hunting and trapping of native species has been delegated to state fish and wildlife agencies. None of the proposed rules exceed the authorities granted the states in 50 CFR 10. Additionally, the proposed modifications to the early September Canada goose hunt are consistent with the parameters established by the Fish and Wildlife Service in 50 CFR 20.105.

State Regulatory Analysis: These rule changes do not represent policy or significant rule changes that may differ from surrounding states. All surrounding states have regulations and rules in place for the management and recreational use of wild big game, upland, migratory and furbearer species that are established based on needs which often are unique to that state's resources or public desires. In most circumstances however, hunting and wild game regulations are fairly consistent in the surrounding states. For instance, Illinois, Iowa, Michigan and Minnesota all offer Canada goose hunting over the Labor Day weekend to some extent. Each of these states have established zones and seasons for managing turkey, furbearer and deer populations.

Section 19. NR 10.106 (1) is amended to read:

NR 10.106 (1) CARCASS CONDITION AND TRANSPORTATION. Deer shall be intact except they may be field dressed, skinned and the following portions of the lower legs removed; from the hooves up to the tarsus joint on the hind legs and from the hooves up to the carpus joint on the front legs. Deer may be ~~skinned and~~ quartered by persons holding a Class A or B disabled hunting permit. Bear may be skinned and quartered. These animals or animal parts may not be removed from the area specified in this section unless exhibited, registered and tagged. If skinned or the lower legs are removed, the entire skin or portions of the lower leg shall accompany the carcass until the deer or bear is registered.

Note: Common terms for the tarsus or second major joint on the rear legs up from the hoof include "hock" and "ankle" and common terms for the carpus or second major joint on the front legs up from the hoof include "wrist" and "knee".

Section 20. NR 10.27(2) is amended to read:

NR 10.27(2) FIREARM SEASON. Deer hunting by firearm is allowed in Natural Bridge, ~~and~~ Wyalusing and Governor Thompson state parks during the season specified in s. NR 10.01 (3) (e) 3.

Note: The deer gun season established in s. NR 10.01(3)(e)3.g. at Governor Thompson State Park is subject to review following the completion of the property master plan.

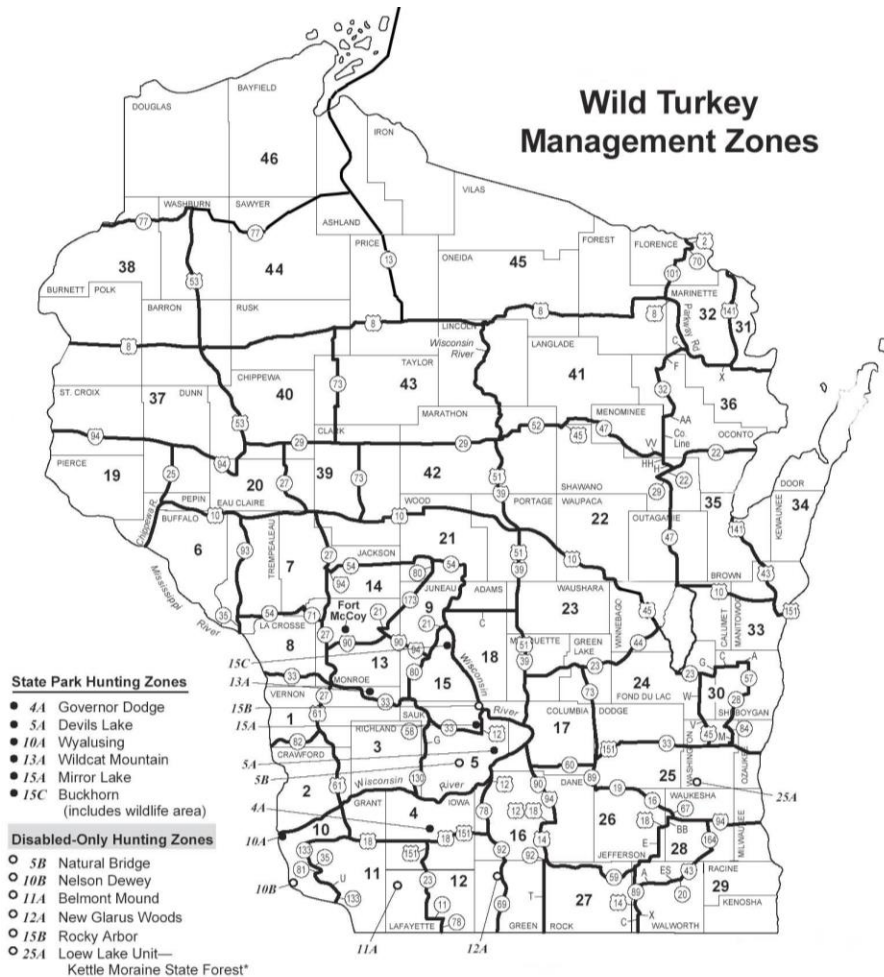
Section 23. NR 10.27(7) is amended to read:

NR 10.01 (3) (e) 3., (es) and for the ~~December portion of late archery season established in s. NR 10.01 (3) (em)1.~~ for Newport and Mill Bluff state parks. Additionally, deer hunting by bow and arrow shall begin on October 15 and continue for the remainder of the season established in s. NR 10.01 (3) (em) for Mill Bluff state park.
