

## WISCONSIN LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ACT MEMO

## 2015 Wisconsin Act 252 [2015 Senate Bill 485]

## **Consumer Protection Violations Against the Elderly and Disabled**

Wisconsin law allows a court to impose a supplemental forfeiture of up to \$10,000 for violations of certain laws enforced by the Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (DATCP) if the defendant's conduct was perpetrated against an elderly person<sup>1</sup> or disabled person<sup>2</sup> and the court finds that certain factors are present.

2015 Wisconsin Act 252 expands the list of violations of laws enforced by DATCP for which a court may impose a supplemental forfeiture to include laws relating to the following:

- Future service plans.
- Rental vehicles.
- Self-service storage facilities.
- Time shares.
- Foreclosure consultants.
- Prize notices.
- Mail-order sales.
- Unfair billing.
- Vehicle protection product warranties.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> "Disabled person" means a person who has an impairment of a physical, mental, or emotional nature that substantially limits at least one major life activity. "Major life activity" means self-care, walking, seeing, hearing, speaking, breathing, learning, performing manual tasks, or being able to be gainfully employed.
