## 2017 Assembly Bill 396

# **Assembly Amendment 1**

#### 2017 ASSEMBLY BILL 396

Assembly Bill 396 provides that whoever does any of the following while participating in a riot is guilty of a Class A misdemeanor: (1) blocks or obstructs the lawful use by any other person of any private or public thoroughfare; or (2) blocks or obstructs any positions of access or exit to any private or public building or dwelling. The penalty for a Class A misdemeanor is a fine not to exceed \$10,000 or imprisonment not to exceed nine months, or both.

The bill defines "riot" as a public disturbance involving at least one of the following:

- An act of violence by one or more persons that are part of an assembly of at least three persons, that constitutes a clear and present danger of, or would result in, damage or injury to the property of any other person or to another person.
- A threat of the commission of an act of violence by one or more persons that are part
  of an assembly of at least three persons having, individually or collectively, the ability
  of immediate execution of the threat, if the performance of the threatened act of
  violence would constitute a clear and present danger of, or would result in, damage
  or injury to the property of any other person or to another person.

## ASSEMBLY AMENDMENT 1

Assembly Amendment 1 adds intent elements to the bill. First, the amendment provides that whoever does any of the following while **intentionally**<sup>1</sup> participating in a riot is guilty of a

Class A misdemeanor: (1) blocks or obstructs the lawful use by any other person of any private or public thoroughfare; or (2) blocks or obstructs any positions of access or exit to any private or public building or dwelling.

Second, the amendment amends the definition of "riot" to require an **intentional** act of violence or an **intentional** threat of the commission of an act of violence. Specifically, under the amendment, "riot" means a public disturbance involving at least one of the following:

- An intentional act of violence by one or more persons that are part of an assembly of at least three persons, that constitutes a clear and present danger of, or would result in, damage or injury to the property of any other person or to another person.
- An intentional threat of the commission of an act of violence by one or more persons
  that are part of an assembly of at least three persons having, individually or
  collectively, the ability of immediate execution of the threat, if the performance of the
  threatened act of violence would constitute a clear and present danger of, or would
  result in, damage or injury to the property of any other person or to another person.

## **BILL HISTORY**

Assembly Amendment 1 was offered by Representative Spiros on October 11, 2017. On October 12, 2017, the Assembly Committee on Judiciary recommended: (1) adoption of the amendment on a vote of Ayes, 8; Noes, 0; and (2) passage of the bill, as amended, on a vote of Ayes, 6; Noes, 2.
