2005 SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 83

May 3, 2006 – Introduced by Senators Breske, Carpenter, Taylor, Miller, Decker, Wirch and Robson, cosponsored by Representatives Pope-Roberts, Sherman, Lehman, Toles, Berceau, Black, Fields, Grigsby, Hebl, Kessler, Kreuser, Molepske, Nelson, Pocan, Parisi, Richards, Seidel, Sheridan, Shilling, Sinicki, Van Akkeren, Vruwink, Wasserman, Turner and Zepnick. Referred to Committee on Education.

1	Relating to: calling for changes to the state's public school funding formula to be
2	enacted by July 1, 2007.
3	Whereas, article X, section 3, of the Wisconsin Constitution, as interpreted by
4	the Wisconsin Supreme Court in Vincent v. Voight, 236 Wis. 2d 588 (2000), requires
5	the state to provide each child with "an equal opportunity for a sound basic
6	education"; and
7	Whereas, some school districts are on the brink of dissolution in part due to
8	declining enrollment and the significant financial restraints imposed by a school aid
9	formula that determines school district revenue limits on a per pupil basis; and
LO	Whereas, some of the lowest income areas in the state are burdened with the
11	highest property taxes because the state school aid formula is based upon property
12	values; and
13	Whereas, school districts must seek the approval of the electors at a referendum

in order to comply with state and federal education mandates instead of being able

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to invest local resources in programs that provide students with optional educational 1 $\mathbf{2}$ opportunities beyond the minimum requirements; now, therefore, be it 3 **Resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That** a new school finance system should be in place beginning on July 1, 2007; and, be it further 4 5 **Resolved.** That in order to meet the requirements of the Wisconsin 6 Constitution and state and federal laws, the new school finance system should have 7 the following key components: 8 1. Funding levels based on what is needed to operate efficient, effective schools 9 and classrooms rather than based on arbitrary per pupil measures; 10 $\mathbf{2}$. State resources sufficient to prepare all children, regardless of their 11 circumstances, for post-secondary education, employment, and citizenship and to satisfy state and federal mandates; 123. Additional resources and flexibility sufficient to meet special circumstances, 1314 including student circumstances such as non-English speaking students; students 15with physical, mental, or social health needs; and students from low-income 16 households, and district circumstances such as large geographic size; low population 17density; low family income; and significant changes in enrollment; 18 4. A combination of state funds and a reduced level of local property taxes. 19 derived and distributed in a manner that treats all taxpayers equitably regardless 20of local property wealth and income; and, be it further 21**Resolved**, **That** the senate chief clerk shall provide a copy of this joint 22resolution to the governor of Wisconsin and the cochairs of the joint committee on 23finance.
