Chairman Kuglitsch and Members of the Assembly Committee on Energy and Utilities,

Thank you for holding a hearing on Assembly Bill 349, regarding the applicability of requirements of the one-call system, commonly referred to as Digger's Hotline.

On July 10, 2018, a gas line in downtown Sun Prairie was struck, causing an evacuation of the area. About 40 minutes after emergency crews responded, the gas line exploded. The explosion occurred because the gas lines had been incorrectly marked by USCI, an Indiana-based utility locating service. In addition, the subcontractor, VC Tech, did not contact Digger's Hotline, because they were told by the main contractor, Bear Communications, that it had already been done. This breakdown in communication and proper line locating led to the death of a Sun Prairie Volunteer Firefighter, injuries to two others, and leveled several businesses and houses in downtown Sun Prairie.

AB349 is not a complicated bill. It simply clarifies who must contact Digger's Hotline before excavation. It affirms that subcontractors must also contact Digger's Hotline on their own in order to get lines located and seeks to prevent "piggy-backing" on other line location requests.

We have spent the better part of the last 14 months talking with constituents and utility companies to come up with ideas on how to best prevent another situation like we had in Sun Prairie. Our goal is to prevent any communication failures or confusion and ensure that lines get correctly located without adding new regulations that will overburden the one-call system or contractors. We believe this bill threads that needle. It adds no additional hoops to jump through; it simply clarifies what should be happening anyway.

Last summer Sun Prairie had an explosion when a gas line ruptured and led to the death of a volunteer firefighter and injuries two two others while leveling several businesses in the downtown portion. This tragedy should have never happened, but the main contractor told the subcontractor they had already contacted Digger's Hotline.

Earlier this year I was contacted by Representative Hebl to be a co-author of this legislation that defines who must contact Digger's Hotline before excavation. This is a good bill that will help bring clarification to who needs to be contacting Digger's Hotline so we can avoid such tragedies in the future.
