

The WCOC was able to achieve a program goal of increasing the number of participants in the OWI Court program. From October 1, 2012 to October 1, 2013 participant enrollment expand from 17 to 37 active participants, a 118% increase. Two primary factors led to the increase. First, the addition of a now full-time, Treatment Court Coordinator; this position is able to increase capacity by conducting screenings, collecting data, applying for grants, etc., thereby allowing probation, treatment, and other team members to focus solely on their specific job duties. Second, being the inclusion of OWI 4<sup>th</sup> offenders which have consisted of 40% of 2013 year-to-date admissions.

Additionally, the WCOC has made progress in diverting offenders from jail. Walworth County follows a sentencing matrix for OWI offenders that break down recommended/offered sentences by BAC and aggravated/non-aggravated charges. For OWI 4<sup>th</sup> charges, all offenders are facing a minimum of 360 days in jail. Electronic monitoring was started January 2013 in Walworth County as well, further diverting non-violent offenders out of the jail system. In the WCOC program, all participants receive half of the mandatory minimum jail sentences (OWI 3<sup>rd</sup> = 15 days; OWI 4<sup>th</sup> = 30 days; OWI 4<sup>th</sup> Felony = 6 months) because of the treatment court reduction the statute allows. It's difficult to calculate the actual amount of jail days and costs saved because sentencing estimates are coming from a guideline and because of the options of electronic monitoring, Huber release, and jail sentences. Using these estimates, the WCOC has saved 16,905 supervised days.

- 55% of 2013 OWI 3<sup>rd</sup> offenders were offered OWI Court; 49% were screened, 43% entered the WCOC Program.
  - 40% increase in OWI 3<sup>rd</sup> participation from 2012 to 2013

- 71% of 2013 OWI 4<sup>th</sup> offenders were screened with 50% of offenders entering the program in 2013.
- 27% of 2013 OWI (4<sup>th</sup> w/ 5 yrs) Felony offenders entered the WCOC

OWI offenses decreased in 2013 by 28.8%, yet the WCOC continues to see an increase in participation.

Since inception of October 2011:

- 61 OWI 3<sup>rd</sup> Participants
- 15 OWI 4<sup>th</sup> Participants
- 4 OWI 4<sup>th</sup> Felony Participants
- 17 females, 63 males
- Average time from arrest to sentence is 19.7 weeks
- 31 graduations (22 males, 9 females) with an average completion time of 60.5 weeks. Most common delays in graduation are an inability to fulfill the financial obligation (court costs), followed by relapses.
  - Average time in Phase 1: 15 weeks
  - Average time in Phase 2: 12 weeks
  - Average time in Phase 3: 13 weeks
  - Average time in Phase 4: 19 weeks
- Average monthly enrollment: 3 Participants
- Completion Rate: 82%
  - 6 terminations for noncompliance
  - 3 medical terminations
  - 1 voluntary removal
- 93% Caucasian, 7% Hispanic
- Average age: 44
- Average age at first alcohol use: 16
  - 22% reported first alcohol use under the age of 16
- Age at first drug use: 16
  - 29% reported first drug use under the age of 16
- Alcohol Abuse Diagnosis: 36%
- Alcohol Dependent Diagnosis: 64%
- Diagnosed with Drug Abuse/Dependence/in Remission: 20%
- Diagnosed Co-occurring Disorders: 11%
- Anecdotally, 1 OWI arrest after graduation
  
- As of 6/25/14, number of active participants is 39; 27 OWI 3<sup>rd</sup>, 8 OWI 4<sup>th</sup>, 4 OWI 4<sup>th</sup> Felony
