Family Foundations Comprehensive Home Visiting Program

DCF, in partnership with DHS, administers the Family Foundations Comprehensive Home Visiting (FFHV) Program. We currently fund 14 evidence-based home visiting programs that operate in 15 counties and 4 tribal communities. The FFHV program serves at-risk families that live in high-risk communities identified through a needs assessment in 2010. Home visiting programs are voluntary, and our goal is to offer women supportive services as early as possible during pregnancy. Generally, home visitors are nurses, social workers, or paraprofessionals (depending on the home visiting model), and they meet with program participants in the homes on a weekly basis. Typical visit activities can include:

- Assisting with access to quality prenatal care
- Conducting screenings and assessments
- Providing health education
- Connecting the family to valuable community resources
- Offering strategies for parents to support their child's development physically, socially, and emotionally

In a collaborative way, home visitors and the families they serve identify a set of goals and activities to work on together, all with the goal of ensuring the healthy development of the child and the well-being of the family.

Home Visiting Data System Development:

WI Department of Health Services/DHS to enhance the State's public health data base—the Secure Public Health Electronic
Record Environment (SPHERE)—so that home visiting programs can use it for quality assurance and continuous quality
improvement projects, and to meet federal reporting requirements and demonstrate compliance with State statutes. DHS is
also facilitating a project to improve data quality and reduce data collection burden through the programming and distribution
of SPHERE compatible handheld devices for home visitors to use in the field.

Program Evaluation Support:

University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and University of Illinois-Chicago for the evaluation of on-going home visiting program implementation

Wisconsin Home Visiting State Team:

The Home Visiting State Team, made up of the the DCF Home Visiting Coordinator, Performance Analyst, Research Analyst, and DHS Nurse Home Visiting Consultant (currently vacant), facilitates the development of the statewide network of home visiting programs, including the on-going enhancement of professional development support systems; further advancement of SPHERE for use by the network's programs; building a network-wide continuous quality improvement process; training and technical support direct to grantee programs; and contract monitoring and oversight.
