SUBJECT: Assembly Bill 912/Senate Bill 769 -- Rural Economic Development

Assembly Bill 912 and Senate Bill 769 are companion bills that would provide funding to the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) for economic development programs in rural areas of the state. AB 912 was introduced on February 2, 2018, and referred to the Assembly Committee on Rural Development and Mining. SB 769 was introduced on February 5, 2018, and referred to the Senate Committee on Economic Development, Commerce, and Local Government. That committee recommended SB 769 for passage by a vote of 7 to 0 on February 8, 2018.

## SUMMARY AND FISCAL EFFECT OF BILLS

The bills would create an annual appropriation of \$50 million GPR beginning in 2018-19 to WEDC for rural economic development programs and grants to authorities and state agencies. From the new appropriation, WEDC would be authorized to expend moneys for economic development programs in rural counties. However, before WEDC first expends money on each new program it begins after the bill's effective date, it would have to notify the Joint Committee on Finance, in writing, of its intention to expend those monies. The notice would have to describe the program and purposes for which WEDC proposes to expend the moneys, subject to a 14-day passive review by the Committee. WEDC would have to adopt policies and procedures establishing, to the extent feasible, matching requirements for its expenditures under these provisions.

WEDC could also award grants from its new appropriation to other authorities or state agencies if it determines the expenditure of those moneys will assist economic development in a rural county. Grant awards would also be subject to a 14-day passive review by the Committee.

A "rural county" would mean any county with a population density of less than 155 residents per square mile. The Attachment to this paper shows estimated population densities, by county, in 2017, based on data from the Demographic Services Center in the Department of Administration (DOA). Based on this data, the following 16 counties have a population of more than 155 residents per square mile, and WEDC could not expend moneys from its new appropriation to benefit those counties: Milwaukee, Waukesha, Kenosha, Racine, Brown, Dane, Winnebago, Ozaukee, Washington, Outagamie, La Crosse, Rock, Walworth, Calumet, Eau Claire, and Sheboygan.

Before WEDC expends moneys under the above provisions, it would be required to consider the economic impact of the program or activity for which the moneys will be used.

By June 30 of each fiscal year, WEDC would have to: (a) submit a report to DOA describing in detail its use in that fiscal year of the moneys appropriated under the bills; and (b) pay to the Secretary of Administration for deposit in the general fund all moneys it receives under the new appropriation but does not expend or encumber in that fiscal year.

The bills would require all other authorities and all state agencies, to the extent needed, as determined by WEDC, to cooperate with WEDC concerning its planning and implementation of its expenditures under the bills.

The bills' provisions would not apply after June 30, 2038. If future Legislatures were to provide \$50 million GPR annually for this appropriation through 2037-38, \$1.0 billion GPR would be provided to the program over the 20-year period. WEDC had indicated its existing funds are sufficient to administer these provisions.
