SUBJECT: Summary of the Governor's 2021-23 Building Program

Attached is a summary of bill drafts related to the Governor's recommended building program for the 2021-23 biennium. On March 17, 2021, a series of motions before the Building Commission to recommend the Governor's proposed building program for consideration by the Joint Finance Committee (JFC) resulted in 4-4 tie votes. The attached summary of the Governor's proposal for the 2021-23 building program may assist JFC and the Legislature as they consider which projects requested by state agencies or recommended by the Governor to include in the building program for the 2021-23 biennium.

In addition, the attachment includes a summary (beginning on page 12) of general and revenue obligation bonding authority proposed in the Governor's recommended building program and in 2021 Assembly Bill 68/Senate Bill 111 (the 2021-23 budget bill). Under the two proposals, new bonding authorization of \$3,639,099,200 is recommended. Of that, \$1,954,776,000 is for the building program (including \$13,000,000 for transportation administrative facilities in the 2021-23 budget bill) and an additional \$1,684,323,200 for other borrowing purposes included in the 2021-23 budget bill.

BUILDING PROGRAM

1. 2021-23 ENUMERATED PROJECTS

All Funds \$2,229,395,700

Governor: Provide \$2,229,395,700 from all funding sources of 2021-23 building program financing authority for: (a) specific enumerated projects (\$1,703,871,200); and (b) all agency projects (\$525,524,500).

Specify that funding for enumerated and all agency projects be drawn from the following sources: (a) \$1,877,161,700 from new general obligation bonding authority; (b) \$9,537,800 from general obligation bonding authority that is currently authorized; (c) \$13,000,000 of new transportation revenue bonding authority; (d) \$43,160,700 from agency operating funds; (e) \$47,188,500 from federal funds; and (f) \$239,347,000 from gifts, grants, and other receipts.

The funding sources for the 2021-23 building program by agency are shown in Table 1. The major agency projects enumerated as part of the 2021-23 state building program, as recommended by the Governor, are listed in Table 2. Tables 3 and 4 list the projects included in the UW System's instructional space projects program and the minor facilities renewal projects program.

3. MODIFICATIONS TO PRIOR BUILDING PROGRAMS

Governor: Modify prior building programs as follows:

a. **2015-17 Building Program**

(1) Under projects financed by GPR-supported borrowing, increase the amount for the "Central Wisconsin Center-life safety renovations Buildings 1 and 6 - Madison" project under the Department of Health Services from \$15,808,000 to \$22,448,400.

b. **2017-19 Building Program**

- (1) Under projects financed by GPR-supported borrowing, change the name of the project identified as "Wisconsin Veterans Home at King food service system upgrades" to "Wisconsin Veterans Home at King central services kitchen upgrade" under the Department of Veterans Affairs and increase the amount from \$2,450,300 to \$4,086,200.
- (2) Under projects financed by PR-supported borrowing, change the name of the project identified as "Wisconsin Veterans Home at King food service system upgrades" to "Wisconsin Veterans Home at King central services kitchen upgrade" under the Department of Veterans Affairs and increase the amount from \$4,550,700 to \$7,588,800.
- (3) Under projects financed by GPR-supported borrowing, change the name of the project identified as "Wisconsin Veterans Home at King water improvements" to "Wisconsin Veterans Home at King domestic water treatment" under the Department of Veterans Affairs and increase the amount from \$833,700 to \$2,234,700.
- (4) Under projects financed by GPR-supported borrowing, increase the amount for the "Expansion of the Mendota Juvenile Treatment Center Madison" project under the Department of Health Services from \$43,994,000 to \$65,955,200.

c. **2019-21 Building Program**

- (1) Under projects financed by GPR-supported borrowing, increase the amount for the "Stanley Correctional Institution new health services unit Stanley" under the Department of Corrections from \$10,633,000 to \$14,126,000.
- (2) Under projects financed by GPR-supported borrowing, change the name of the project identified as "Wisconsin Educational Services Program for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing comprehensive code upgrades Pewaukee" to "Wisconsin Education Services Program for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing New Huff Hall Dormitory Pewaukee" under the Department of Public Instruction and increase the amount from \$7,388,300 to \$25,000,000.

4. BONDING AUTHORIZATIONS FOR PREVIOUS BUILDING PROGRAMS

Governor: Provide \$64,614,300 of new general obligation bonding authority for projects authorized in previous building programs, as shown in the following table.

5. STATE INDUSTRY AND LABOR BUILDING (GEF 1) REPLACEMENT

Governor: Allocate \$4,000,000 of building trust funds to develop preliminary plans and specifications for the replacement of the GEF 1 state office building and the redevelopment of block 108 in Madison. According to the administration, the current facility has exceeded its useful life expectancy and many building components and systems, such HVAC, electrical, plumbing, and building envelop, have reached the point where critical maintenance upgrades are necessary.

6. STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY HEADQUARTERS, PHASE II

Governor: Allocate \$2,400,000 of building trust funds to develop preliminary plans and specifications for phase II of the renovation of the State Historical Society headquarters in Madison. According to the administration, several areas of the headquarters were made available as a result of relocating artifacts to the state archive preservation facility. These areas need to be repurposed and renovated for other needs. In 2020, a firm was hired to evaluate the building's history, identify existing problems, complete a preservation plan, and develop preliminary budgets for subsequent projects. The consultant will also complete a building use and program study to evaluate program needs and provide recommendations.

7. BEYOND VISION CENTER

Governor: Enumerate a \$19,000,000 project for the Beyond Vision (VisABILITY) center under the 2021-23 state building program. Authorize the Building Commission to provide \$5,000,000 of GPR-supported borrowing to assist Wiscraft, Inc. in purchasing and renovating a

facility in Milwaukee County for the employment of and provision of other related services to blind and visually impaired individuals. The fiscal effect is included in Items #1 and #2.

Require that the state funding commitment be in the form of a grant to Wiscraft, Inc. Specify that, before approving any state funding commitment for the construction of the center, the Building Commission make a determination that Wiscraft, Inc., has secured additional funding for the project of at least \$14,000,000 from non-state revenue sources. Require that if the Building Commission makes a grant to Wiscraft, Inc., for the construction of the Beyond Vision center, the state would retain an ownership interest in the remodeled space equal to the amount of the state's grant if, for any reason, the space is not used for the employment of and provision of other related services to blind and visually impaired individuals.

Specify that the Legislature finds and determines that the employment of individuals who are blind or visually impaired, including statewide remote employment, and the provision of other related services to those individuals, improves those individuals' lives, increases the workforce and reduces unemployment in this state, and is a statewide responsibility of statewide dimension. Further specify that it is in the public interest, and it is the public policy of this state, to assist Wiscraft, Inc., with constructing the Beyond Vision center for the employment of and provision of other related services to blind and visually impaired individuals.

Specify that the Building Commission may not make a grant to Wiscraft, Inc., for the construction of the center unless DOA has reviewed and approved plans for the project, although DOA may not supervise any services or work or let any contracts for the project. Further specify that the contracts for the project would not require approval of the DOA Secretary or the Governor.

Create a GPR sum sufficient appropriation to fund the debt service payments and any payments on an agreement or ancillary arrangement associated with the bonding authorized for the project. Provide that these payments could be made through the bond security and redemption fund appropriation.

8. KENOSHA STEM INNOVATION CENTER

Governor: Enumerate a \$19,500,000 project for the Kenosha science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) innovation center under the 2021-23 state building program. Authorize the Building Commission to provide \$9,750,000 of GPR-supported borrowing to the City of Kenosha to construct a STEM innovation center at the site previously occupied by the Chrysler facility in the city. The fiscal effect is included in Items #1 and #2.

Require that the state funding commitment be in the form of a grant to the City of Kenosha. Specify that, before approving any state funding commitment for the construction of the center, the Building Commission make a determination that the City of Kenosha has secured additional funding for the project of at least \$9,750,000 from non-state revenue sources. Require that if the Building Commission makes a grant to the City of Kenosha for the construction of the STEM innovation center, the state would retain an ownership interest in the space equal to the amount of the state's grant if, for any reason, the space is not used as a science, technology, engineering, and mathematics innovation center.

Specify that the Legislature finds and determines that meeting the state's workforce needs, providing opportunities for residents of this state to learn new job skills, and supporting innovation and entrepreneurship in this state are of vital importance in expanding industries in this state, creating jobs, and improving the municipal, regional, and state economies and are statewide responsibilities of statewide dimension. Further specify that it is in the public interest, and it is the public policy of this state, to assist the city of Kenosha in the construction of a STEM innovation center located in the city of Kenosha.

Specify that the Building Commission may not make a grant to the City of Kenosha for the construction of the center unless DOA has reviewed and approved plans for the project, although DOA may not supervise any services or work or let any contracts for the project. Further specify that the contracts for the project would not require approval of the DOA Secretary or the Governor.

Create a GPR sum sufficient appropriation to fund the debt service payments and any payments on an agreement or ancillary arrangement associated with the bonding authorized for the project. Provide that these payments could be made through the bond security and redemption fund appropriation.

9. WISCONSIN MUSEUM OF NATURE AND CULTURE

Governor: Enumerate a \$170,000,000 project for the Wisconsin Museum of Nature and Culture under the 2021-23 state building program. Authorize the Building Commission to provide \$40,000,000 of GPR-supported borrowing to the Milwaukee Development Corporation to construct a Wisconsin Museum of Nature and Culture to be located in the City of Milwaukee. The fiscal effect is included in Items #1 and #2.

Require that the state funding commitment be in the form of a grant to the Milwaukee Development Corporation. Specify that, before approving any state funding commitment for the construction of the museum, the Building Commission make a determination that the Milwaukee Development Corporation has secured additional funding for the project of at least \$130,000,000 from non-state revenue sources. Require that if the Building Commission makes a grant to the Milwaukee Development Corporation for the construction of the museum, the state would retain an ownership interest in the space equal to the amount of the state's grant if, for any reason, the space is not used as a museum of nature and culture.

Specify that the Legislature finds and determines that providing education, programming, and immersive exhibits concerning Wisconsin's natural history and the intersection of nature and culture in Wisconsin and the world vastly enriches the lives of the citizens of this state and is a statewide responsibility of statewide dimension. Further specify that it is in the public interest, and it is the public policy of this state, to assist the Milwaukee Development Corporation in the construction of a new building to serve as a natural history museum known as the Wisconsin Museum of Nature and Culture in the City of Milwaukee.

Specify that the Building Commission may not make a grant to the Milwaukee Development Corporation for the construction of the museum unless DOA has reviewed and approved plans for the project, although DOA may not supervise any services or work or let any contracts for the project.

Further specify that the contracts for the project would not require approval of the DOA Secretary or the Governor.

Create a GPR sum sufficient appropriation to fund the debt service payments and any payments on an agreement or ancillary arrangement associated with the bonding authorized for the project. Provide that these payments could be made through the bond security and redemption fund appropriation.

10. STATEMENT OF BUILDING PROGRAM CONTINUATION

Governor: Continue the building and financing authority enumerated under previous building programs into the 2021-23 biennium. Each building program is approved only for the current biennium; this provision would continue past state building programs into the 2021-23 biennium.

11. PROJECT LOANS

Governor: Authorize the Building Commission, during the 2021-23 biennium, to make loans from general fund-supported borrowing or the building trust fund to state agencies for any 2021-23 building program projects funded from non-GPR sources.
