

HIGHLIGHTS OF EDUCATION IN WISCONSIN

Universities and Colleges — A total of 180,979 students enrolled in the University of Wisconsin System for the 2014 fall semester. The UW-Extension's credit outreach enrolled 43,051 students in the 2012-13 fiscal year.

Wisconsin's private institutions of higher education encompass a broad range of schools, including 8 universities, 10 colleges, 6 technical and professional schools, 3 theological seminaries, and 2 tribal colleges. Over the past five years, enrollments in private institutions have stayed steady with a total of 65,363 students in 2013-14.

Technical Colleges — Wisconsin's Technical College System had a total enrollment of 326,544 students in 2013-14. Enrollments for individual institutions that year ranged from 7,085 at Nicolet Area Technical College to 44,437 at Fox Valley Technical College.

Elementary and Secondary Schools — Following a peak enrollment of 999,921 in 1971-72, public school registrations declined to a low of 767,542 in 1984-85. In the last 10 years, enrollments have remained midway between those levels, with a total of 870,652 in 2014-15.

In the 2014-15 school year, 123,104 students, or 12.4% of Wisconsin's estimated 1 million elementary and secondary pupils, were enrolled in private schools. Over the last 10 years, private school enrollments have decreased by almost 14,000 students.

Teachers — Of Wisconsin's 55,624 public school teachers employed in the 2014-15 school year, 39,438 taught in elementary grades and 16,187 were secondary teachers. In the 2014-15 school year, Wisconsin's average salary for all teachers was \$54,535. Nationally, Wisconsin ranked 22nd for the 2013-14 school year. New York had the highest average salary that year at an estimated \$76,409. South Dakota's average salary was the lowest at \$40,023.

Educational Alternatives — Reported enrollment in Wisconsin home-based private education programs reached a peak of 21,288 students during 2002-03, and, after a period of decline, resurged to 19,850 in 2014-15. In the 2014-15 school year, Wisconsin charter school enrollments totaled 44,292 students.

Educational Expenditures — State and local expenditures for education in Wisconsin for 2013-14 totaled \$17.5 billion, or \$3,062 per capita, based on Wisconsin's estimated population. Wisconsin ranked 20th in the nation with total expenditures per pupil of \$11,233 in the 2011-12 fiscal year, while New York was first (\$19,396) and Utah was 50th (\$6,441). In fiscal year 2013-14, school costs in Wisconsin totaled \$10.7 billion. The 2013-14 cost per pupil was \$12,546.

Educational Attainment — For 2012-13, Wisconsin schools conferred 2,507 doctoral-level degrees, 9,653 master's degrees, and 36,927 bachelor's degrees. In the same year, it awarded 59,890 public high school diplomas.

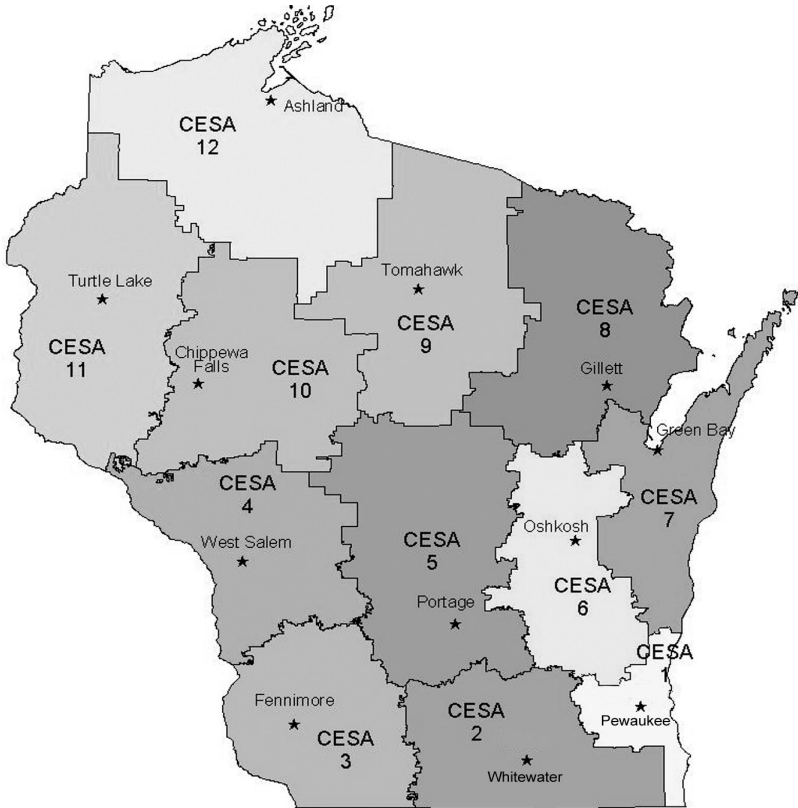
