

HIGHLIGHTS OF EMPLOYMENT AND INCOME IN WISCONSIN

Labor Force — There were 2,923,533 workers employed in Wisconsin in 2014. Another 170,385 were part of the available workforce but were unemployed, resulting in an average unemployment rate of 5.5% for 2014. Since 1990, Wisconsin's labor force has increased by about 546,000 thousand workers from 2,567,200 to 3,113,100 in 2014.

Employment by Industry — An average of 2.85 million Wisconsin workers were engaged in nonfarm employment in 2014. The greatest number worked in service providing (2,272,500); and goods producing (572,600).

Nationally, 138.8 million were employed in nonfarm work in February 2015. Trade, transportation, and utilities, with 26.3 million workers; and government, with 22.3 million, were the largest segments.

In March 2013, manufacturing and retail trade together accounted for approximately one-third of the number of employees in Wisconsin. The majority (84.1%) of the 137,983 business establishments in the state had fewer than 20 employees in March 2013. Manufacturing accounted for the greatest number of large-sized firms, 338 out of 1,124 establishments with 250 or more employees.

Income by Industry — Earned income, which consists of wages and salaries, labor income, and proprietor's income, totaled \$184.1 billion in Wisconsin in 2014. Service industries provided the greatest percentage of Wisconsin's earned income during that year, about 32.9%, with manufacturing at 18.6%. Government (all levels) and government enterprises were third at 15.4%.

Personal Income — Personal income in Wisconsin totaled \$256.7 billion in 2014. Wisconsin's per capita personal income of \$44,585 lags behind the national average of \$46,129, ranking Wisconsin 26th among the states. Connecticut had the highest per capita personal income (\$62,467 in 2014, or about 135% of the national average). Mississippi had the lowest per capita personal income in 2014 at \$34,333, about 77.4% of the national average.

Wisconsin's total adjusted gross income (total income reported for tax purposes) in 2013 was about \$154 billion, or \$50,670 per tax return. Ozaukee County had the highest per return AGI in 2013 at \$93,280, followed by Waukesha County at \$78,080. Eau Claire County is third (\$68,660), and Dane County is fourth (\$63,890). Rusk County (\$33,620), Forest County (\$31,280), and Menominee County (\$15,600) had the lowest per return adjusted gross incomes.

Unemployment Benefits — During the fourth quarter of 2014, Wisconsin reported that 51,900 persons (about 36% of the 144,600 unemployed) received unemployment compensation. Nationally, 2.3 million people, or 27% of the 8.5 million unemployed, received benefits during an average month. The average weekly benefit in Wisconsin was \$289.50, less than the national average of \$317.93. The highest average weekly benefit of \$443.89 was paid in North Dakota, followed by Massachusetts (\$441.04), and Hawaii (\$439.10). Lowest in the nation were Alabama (\$214.34), Louisiana (\$206.40), and Mississippi (\$202.67).
