Purpose of Report

The purpose of this report is to provide the annual update on the status of the Frequent Sobriety Testing Pilot Program as designated by Wisc. Stat. 165.957, which states the Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) will analyze the information it receives as part of the project and report to the legislature annually. This is the third annual report produced by DOJ.

Composition of the Pilot Project

Initially five counties were randomly selected for participation in the program, based on a stratified sample as described in the 2017 report. It is important to note that participation in the program is voluntary for counties. Currently, the counties agreeing to participate in the pilot project are Green Lake, Manitowoc, and Oneida. DOJ is connecting with these counties and is also in the process of surveying and selecting additional counties to invite additional participation.

Progress to Date

A number of key issues were addressed in 2018 as part of program planning and implementation after legislative and Department of Administration of approval was received. Most of 2018 was spent working on the finalization of the data collection software, which is critical as a mechanism to develop consistency in the data necessary to track and evaluate program outputs and outcomes. DOJ has been working with Intoximeters to complete customizations to the software so it fits the specific needs of Wisconsin, which included testing the software after various development sprints and numerous meetings with the developer. While the work took longer than expected, the system changes were completed in December 2018 and the software is now ready for county use.

In addition, the emergency rules governing the program were published and the process was undertaken for the development and submission of the permanent rule, Jus 19. The permanent rule draft was signed by the governor on December 14, 2018 and submitted to the chief clerks of each house of the legislature on December 18, 2018. Given the timing of both the rule publication and finalization of the software, the project is now set to move forward with implementation during the first quarter of 2019. DOJ will be working with the participating counties to finalize contracts and the design of their individual programs, while meeting minimum requirements to ensure program consistency and alignment with the statute and emergency rules. Due to the current status of program implementation, there is no specific data to report under Wisc. Stat. 165.957(7)(b) yet, but this information will be included in future annual reports as the program is fully implemented.
