



## 2011 ASSEMBLY BILL 551

February 8, 2012 – Introduced by Representatives LITJENS, THIESFELDT, KOOYENGA, PRIDEMORE, KNUDSON, LEMAHIEU, BIES, HONADEL and BROOKS, cosponsored by Senator GALLOWAY. Referred to Committee on Education.

1     **AN ACT** *to renumber* 118.192 (1) and 118.192 (2); *to renumber and amend*  
2           118.192 (3) and 118.192 (4); *to amend* 20.255 (1) (hg), 118.60 (2) (a) 6. a. and  
3           c. and 119.23 (2) (a) 6. a. and c.; and *to create* 118.192 (1) (title) and 118.192  
4           (5), (6) and (7) of the statutes; **relating to:** professional teaching permits issued  
5           by the Department of Public Instruction, the qualifications necessary to teach  
6           in a private school participating in a parental choice program, and making an  
7           appropriation.

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### *Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau*

Under current law, the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) provides an alternative teaching training program consisting of approximately 100 hours of formal instruction. A person who holds a bachelor's degree in engineering, music, art, foreign language, computer science, mathematics, or science; has at least five years of professional experience in the subject area; demonstrates competency in his or her subject area; and satisfactorily completes the 100-hour program, is entitled to a professional teaching permit, which authorizes the person to teach the subject area specified by DPI in grades kindergarten to 12. The initial permit is valid for two years, but is renewable for five-year periods.

This bill establishes three additional ways of obtaining a professional teaching permit. The bill directs DPI to establish a 40-hour teacher training program that

is designed to provide a person with effective instructional techniques and practices and that is to be taught by school district staff. DPI must also develop an examination designed to determine whether a person has mastered the material taught in the training program.

Under the bill, if DPI determines that a person is fluent in a foreign language as well as in English, and the person passes the examination described above, DPI must grant the person a professional teaching permit authorizing him or her to teach the foreign language in grades specified by DPI. If DPI determines that a person has at least an associate of arts degree and at least ten years of exceptional work experience in a particular field, and the person passes the examination described above, DPI must grant the person a professional teaching permit authorizing him or her to teach the subject in which he or she is experienced in grades specified by DPI. Finally, if a person holds a teaching license issued by DPI and passes a proficiency exam, administered by DPI, in a subject in which he or she is not licensed, DPI must grant the person a professional teaching permit authorizing him or her to teach the subject of the examination in the grades that his or her teaching license authorizes him or her to teach.

Under current law, with certain exceptions, all of the teachers in a private school that is participating in a parental choice program (PCP) must have a bachelor's degree.

This bill allows a person to teach in a PCP school if he or she has a bachelor's degree or holds a license or permit to teach issued by DPI.

***The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:***

1           **SECTION 1.** 20.255 (1) (hg) of the statutes is amended to read:  
2           20.255 (1) (hg) *Personnel licensure, teacher supply, information and analysis*  
3 *and teacher improvement.* The amounts in the schedule to fund licensure and  
4 permitting administrative costs under s. ss. 115.28 (7) (d) and, 118.19 (10), and  
5 118.192; teacher supply, information and analysis costs under s. 115.29 (5);; and  
6 teacher improvement under s. 115.41. Ninety percent of all moneys received from  
7 the licensure and permitting of school and public library personnel under s. ss.  
8 115.28 (7) (d) and 118.192, and all moneys received under s. 115.41, shall be credited  
9 to this appropriation.

4           **SECTION 3.** 118.192 (1) of the statutes is renumbered 118.192 (1) (a).

5           **SECTION 4.** 118.192 (2) of the statutes is renumbered 118.192 (1) (b).

6           **SECTION 5.** 118.192 (3) of the statutes is renumbered 118.192 (1) (c) and  
7           amended to read:

8           118.192 (1) (c)   The state superintendent shall ~~grant~~ issue a professional  
9           teaching permit to any person who satisfactorily completes the program under sub-  
10          ~~(2) par. (b).~~ The permit authorizes the person to teach the subject area specified by  
11          the state superintendent in grades kindergarten to 12. ~~The initial permit shall be~~

15          **SECTION 6.** 118.192 (4) of the statutes is renumbered 118.192 (1) (d) and  
16          amended to read:

17          118.192 (1) (d) A school board that employs a person who holds a professional  
18          teaching permit issued under this subsection shall ensure that no regularly licensed  
19          teacher is removed from his or her position as a result of the employment of persons  
20          holding permits.

21          **SECTION 7.** 118.192 (5), (6) and (7) of the statutes are created to read:

22          118.192 (5) FOREIGN LANGUAGE; WORK EXPERIENCE. (a) The department shall  
23          develop the curriculum for a 40-hour teacher training program designed to provide  
24          a person seeking a professional teaching permit under par. (c) or (d) with effective

1 instructional techniques and practices. The program shall be designed to be taught  
2 by school district staff.

3 (b) The department shall develop an examination designed to determine  
4 whether a person has mastered the material taught in the training program under  
5 par. (a). The department may charge a person who takes the examination a fee to  
6 cover the costs of administering and scoring the examination.

7 (c) If the department determines that a person is fluent in a foreign language  
8 and in English and has passed the examination under par. (b), upon application the  
9 department shall issue a professional teaching permit to the person. The permit  
10 authorizes the person to teach the foreign language in grades specified by the  
11 department. The initial permit is valid for 2 years and is renewable for 5-year  
12 periods.

13 (d) If the department determines that a person has at least an associate of arts  
14 degree, has at least 10 years of exceptional work experience in a particular field, and  
15 has passed the examination under par. (b), upon application the department shall  
16 issue a professional teaching permit to the person. The permit authorizes the person  
17 to teach the subject in which he or she is experienced in grades specified by the  
18 department.

19 **(6) ADDITIONAL SUBJECT.** A person who holds a teaching license issued by the  
20 department may apply to the department to take a proficiency examination in a  
21 subject in which he or she is not licensed. The department may charge a person who  
22 takes the examination a fee to cover the costs of administering and scoring the  
23 examination. If the person passes the examination, as determined by the  
24 department, the department shall issue a professional teaching permit to the person.

1 The permit authorizes the person to teach the subject of the examination in the  
2 grades that his or her teaching license authorizes him or her to teach.

3 (7) PERMIT. An initial permit issued under this section is valid for 2 years.  
4 During the initial permit period, a permit holder under sub. (1) or (5) (c) or (d) shall  
5 be supervised by a person who holds a regular teaching license issued by the  
6 department. A permit is renewable for 5-year periods.

7 **SECTION 8.** 118.60 (2) (a) 6. a. and c. of the statutes, as created by 2011  
8 Wisconsin Act 32, are amended to read:

9 118.60 (2) (a) 6. a. Except as provided in subd. 6. c., all of the private school's  
10 teachers have a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution of higher education  
11 or hold a license or permit to teach issued by the department.

12 c. Any teacher employed by the private school on July 1 of the first school year

4 **SECTION 9.** 119.23 (2) (a) 6. a. and c. of the statutes are amended to read:

5 119.23 (2) (a) 6. a. Except as provided in subd. 6. c., all of the private school's  
6 teachers have a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution of higher education  
7 or hold a license or permit to teach issued by the department.

8 c. Any teacher employed by the private school on July 1, 2010, who has been  
9 teaching for at least the 5 consecutive years immediately preceding July 1, 2010, and  
10 who does not satisfy the ~~requirements~~ requirement under subd. 6. a. on July 1, 2010,  
11 ~~applies~~ may apply to the department on a form prepared by the department for a  
12 temporary, nonrenewable waiver from the requirements under subd. 6. a. The
