



1999 ASSEMBLY BILL 766

February 17, 2000 - Introduced by Representatives PETTIS, HAHN, MUSSER, HUTCHISON and JENSEN, cosponsored by Senators BAUMGART and ROSENZWEIG. Referred to Committee on Judiciary and Personal Privacy.

1 **AN ACT to amend** 100.264 (2) (intro.); and **to create** 100.52 of the statutes;
2 **relating to:** prohibiting telephone solicitations during certain hours and
3 providing a penalty.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill prohibits a person from making a telephone solicitation between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m., central time. The department of agriculture, trade, and consumer protection has enforcement authority for the prohibition. A "telephone solicitation" is defined as the unsolicited initiation of a telephone conversation for the purpose of encouraging a person to purchase property, goods or services. The bill's prohibition applies to any interstate telephone solicitation received by a person in this state and any intrastate telephone solicitation. A person who violates the prohibition is subject to a forfeiture of no more than \$500, except that, under certain circumstances, if the telephone solicitation was made to an elderly or disabled person, the person may be subject to a supplemental forfeiture of no more than \$10,000.
