

CHAPTER 15.

[Published September 27, 1862.]

AN ACT to provide for the publication of the laws passed at the extra session, in the year 1862.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The laws which have been or may be passed at the present extra session of the legislature, shall not be published and bound in volumes by themselves, but shall be bound in and with the volumes of laws which may be passed at the next regular session of the legislature.

Laws of extra session to be bound with those of next regular session.

SECTION 2. The secretary of state shall cause five hundred copies of the general laws which have been or may be passed at the present extra session of the legislature, to be published and stitched in pamphlet form, without covers, and forward one copy of the same to each member of this legislature, and distribute the remaining copies as the public interests may, in his opinion, require.

500 may be printed in pamphlet form, &c.

SECTION 3. Publishers of weekly newspapers publishing the laws of the present session, according to section 31 of chapter six of the revised statutes, shall be allowed the sum of five dollars in full for such service.

Publication in newspapers.

SECTION 4. This act shall be published and take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 16.

[Published September 27, 1862.]

AN ACT to provide for the indexing and transcribing [of] the journals of the senate and assembly of the extra session for the year 1862, and for other purposes.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The chief clerks of the senate and assembly are hereby authorized and directed to index

Indexing, transcribing and binding of journals.

and complete the transcribing of the journals of the senate and assembly of the extra session for the year 1862, and to cause the same to be bound in the volume [volumes] of the journals for the regular session for the same year.

Appropriation

SECTION 2. There is hereby appropriated to each of said clerks the sum of twenty-five dollars, which shall be in full payment for services mentioned in section one of this act, and also for services previous [previously] to and at the opening of the present session.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 17.

[Published September 27, 1862.]

AN ACT to empower certain towns in the county of Rock, [counties of Rock, Green and Columbia,] to levy a tax for the payment of bounties to volunteers.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Certain towns
may raise money
to pay bounties
to volunteers,
&c.

SECTION 1. The qualified electors of each of the towns of Center, Plymouth, Union, Bradford, La Prairie, Clinton, Johnstown, Magnolia and Porter, in the county of Rock, and the towns of Albany, Brooklyn and Exeter, in the county of Green, and the town of Arlington, in the county of Columbia, shall have power, at any legal meeting thereof, to vote to raise such sum or sums of money as they may deem necessary for the payment of bounties to volunteers, residents of such towns, respectively, mustered into the service of the United States or of this state, and shall also have power to offer such bounties, and to determine and fix the amount thereof, to be paid to each of such volunteers; and all such sum or sums of money shall be subject to and paid out on the order of the board of supervisors of each such towns, respectively.

SECTION 2. The qualified electors of each of said towns shall have power, at any legal meeting thereof, to vote to appropriate any sum or sums of money that heretofore has been, or that hereafter may be voted or
