SEC. 17. To Atwood and Buck, the sum of three dollars for publishing law relative to time of holding circuit court as per order of the secretary of state.

SEC. 18. To Atwood and Buck, the sum of six hundred and thirty-nine dollars for newspapers furnished the members of the legislature during its present session.

W T Butler. SEC. 19. To Wm. T. Butler, the sum of ten dollars and thirty-five cents for newspapers furnished the members of the legislature during its present session.

Tenney, Smith and Holt. SEC. 20. To Tenney, Smith and Holt, the sum of four hundred ninety-one dollars and four cents for newspapers furnished the members of the legislature at its present session.

Alden & Holt. SEC. 21. To Alden and Holt, the sum of nine dollars and thirty cents for newspapers furnished the members of the legislature during its present session.

H A Wright. SEC. 22. To H. A. Wright, for publishing the official canvass of the late state election in the Prairie du Chien Patriot, the sum of five dollars.

Chap 175

An act to appropriate to H. A. Tenney the sum therein named.

THE People of the State of Wisconsin represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

H A Tenney. SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated to be paid out of any money in the treasury to H. A. Tenney, the sum of five hundred seventy-six dollars and two cents, in full for printing done at the last session of the territorial legislature.

Chap 176

An act for laying out certain roads therein described.

THE People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Road from Ft Atkinson to M. Point. SECTION 1. Milo Jones, Caleb K. Roby and Chancy Isham are hereby appointed commissioners to lay out and establish a certain state road, commencing at the village of Fort Atkinson in Jefferson county, and running westerly on the most practicable route by way

of Stoughton post office, in the town of Dunkirk in Dane county, until it terminates in the Mineral Point road near the store of J. W. Scovill, in the town of Montrose in said county.

SEC. 2. The expense of laying out said road shall be paid by the several towns through which the same shall pass, to be equitably apportioned to each town by said commissioners and collected as other town expenses.

SEC. 3. That William Johnson, James W. Babb, Philip Stagmates are hereby appointed commissioners to lay out and establish a state road from Reedsburg to the town of Prairie du Sac, in the county of Sauk.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

An act to incorporate the Watertown Academy.

Chap 177

THE People of the State of Wisconsin represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Olcott Cheney, George Plassenfeldt and Simeon Ford and their associates and successors, are hereby declared and constituted a body corporate by the name and style of the "Watertown Academy," to be located in the village of Watertown, in the county of Jefferson, for the purposes of education. Corporators.

SEC. 2. Said corporation shall have power to contract and be contracted with, sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, defend and be defended, in all courts whatever; said corporation may have a common seal and alter the same at pleasure, and shall have power to acquire, purchase, receive, possess, hold and enjoy property, real, personal and mixed, not exceeding in value twenty thousand dollars at any one time, and the same to sell and convey, rent or otherwise dispose of at pleasure. Power of corporation.

SEC. 3. The stock of said company shall be divided into shares of ten dollars each which shall be deemed personal property, and shall be transferrable on the books of said corporation in such manner as shall be directed by the trustees of the same. Stock divided.

SEC. 4. The concerns of said corporation shall be managed by five trustees, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. They shall be elected at a meeting to be holden on the first Monday of May next at the Planter's Hotel in the village of Watertown, at one o'clock in the afternoon, and shall hold their offices for one year and until their successors are duly elected. The election of said trustees shall be by ballot; each stockholder shall have one vote for every share by him owned but no stockholder shall have more than five votes: said stockholders shall meet annually on the first Monday of May for the election Trustees, how elected, &c.
