

ment of sewerage debt, and one hundred dollars for drainage, and eight hundred dollars for the building of a cellar. CHAPTER 297.

§ 2. There is hereby appropriated out of any money in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to the Wisconsin Institute for the education of the Blind, the sum of nine thousand dollars, payable in equal quarterly instalments, for the current expenses of the said Institute, for the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and the sum of two thousand dollars for finishing inside of main building, and the sum of one thousand two hundred dollars for building stone portico for north front of main building, and five hundred dollars for furniture to main building when completed.

§ 3. The proper officers of said Institute are hereby authorized and required to take and file vouchers for all moneys, by them expended, in behalf of said Institutes during the current year, and report to the Governor the amounts severally so expended, and the Trustees of such Institutes shall keep a separate account of all the expenditures made in pursuance to the provisions of this act.

§ 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 297.

AN ACT to authorize the Secretary of State to audit certain accounts for newspapers.

The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

SECTION 1. The Secretary of State is hereby authorized to audit the accounts of the several newspaper publishers and news dealers, for papers furnished to the legislature during the present session, and to settle such accounts, allowing said publishers at the rates at which said newspapers are respectively furnished to subscribers at the places of publication.

§ 2. No such account shall be audited for or on account of any paper furnished to any member, officer, or employee of the Assembly, for a greater sum or

CHAPTER 298. different sum than sufficient to pay for the paper specified in the duplicate order, filed in the Secretary's office by the chief clerk of the Assembly, and that no such account shall be audited for or on account of any member, officer or employee of the Senate, for a greater sum or different sum than sufficient to pay for the papers specified in the duplicate order filed in the Secretary's office by the chief clerk of the Senate; and in no case shall the amount so audited exceed a sum sufficient to pay for nine daily newspapers, or their equivalent in weekly newspapers, to each such member, officer and employee.

Secretary authorized to draw warrants.

Appropriation.

§ 3. The Secretary of State is hereby authorized to draw warrants on the State Treasury, in favor of the persons respectively to whom such accounts are found due for newspapers; and there is hereby appropriated out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, a sum sufficient to pay the same.

§ 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 298.

AN ACT to appropriate a certain sum of money to the joint committee on States Prison.

The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Appropriation to committee of Legislature on State Prison.

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of twenty-five dollars, to each of the following named persons, to-wit: A. Alden, W. W. Blackman, Clarkson Miller, F. W. Horn, Jos. Rankin, O. F. Bartlett, Fred. Hilgen, M. D. Seeley, members of the committee on the State's Prison of the Assembly and Senate, for visiting the State's Prison and the State Reform School, and examining and investigating the affairs and accounts of the same.

§ 2. This act shall be in force from and after its passage.
