

LAWS OF WISCONSIN.

CHAPTER 1.

[Published January 21, 1876.]

AN ACT to provide for the appointment of phonographic reporters for the second county court of Brown county, Wisconsin.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be lawful for the judge of the second county court of Brown county, State of Wisconsin, to appoint one or more phonographic reporters for said court, who shall be sworn officers of said court, and who shall be skilled in the art of phonographic reporting, one of whom shall attend upon the said court when required by the judge thereof to attend, and shall perform such duties as the court may require. Judge of county court to appoint reporters.

SECTION 2. The phonographic reporters shall be allowed ten dollars per day for attending the court when required to attend, which shall be certified and paid in like manner as provided by law for the payment of the sheriff for attendance upon the circuit courts of this state; *provided*, that but one reporter shall be employed at the same time. Per diem of reporters.

SECTION 3. In addition to the above compensation, the phonographic reporters may charge and collect as fees ten cents per folio for making and furnishing transcripts of their phonographic notes, to be paid by the party requiring such transcripts to be made. "In the trial of criminal cases, the court may, in its discretion, order such transcripts to be made and filed with the clerk of the said court, and in such cases the fees therefor shall be paid in like manner as the reporters' per diem compensation. Fees of reporters. In criminal cases.

SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
