CHAPTER 61.

AN ACT to authorize and provide for covering certain moneys into the state treasury.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The state board of supervision is hereby authorized and directed to draw its proper warrants therefor and cover back into the state treasury the following unexpended balances of special appropriations: To Wisconsin state hospital for the insane, by chapter 283, laws of 1881, "for fire-proof elevator," four hundred and two dollars and ten cents; to northern hospital for the insane, chapter 258, laws of 1880, "for boarding house," four hundred eighty-two dollars and fifty-four cents; chapter 33, laws of 1882, "for converting old chapel into rooms, and furnishing the same for patients," seven hundred thirty-five dollars and sixty-eight cents; "for removing coal shed and building carpenter shop," eight hundred seventy-nine dollars and seventy-one cents; to Wisconsin institution for the education of the deaf and dumb, chapter 285, laws of 1881, "for architect's fees," etc., two hundred twelve dollars and fifty-four cents; chapter 142, laws of 1883, "for protection against fire," seven hundred eighty dollars and twenty-one cents.

Authorizing the covering of money into the state treasury.

SECTION 2. The said board is further authorized and directed to cover into the state treasury, by warrant, or by request, in writing, to the secretary of state, if the money has not been drawn from the treasury, any unexpended balances of special appropriations, which may hereafter exist, whenever the purposes, for which the appropriations were made shall have been accomplished, and the amount of such balances is greater than may be transferred to current expense funds by existing laws.

Unexpended balances.

SECTION 3. All moneys returned to, or covered into the state treasury, under the provisions of this act, shall be credited to and become a part of the general fund.

SECTION 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
