

not be regarded as a physical disability, and no intoxicated person shall for that reason be entitled to assistance in marking his ballot. After a ballot has been marked for a voter he shall not show it to any person except that it may be submitted to another election officer, or if a blind man, to such person as he may select to ascertain if it has been marked as he desired. The clerk shall enter upon the poll list after the name of any elector who had assistance in marking his ballot a memorandum stating that the ballot was marked by * * * *two inspectors, clerks or ballot clerks*, or by a person selected by a blind man. The provisions of this section shall apply to the marking of ballots upon which any question is submitted to a vote of the people.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 374.

AN ACT to amend subsection 4, of section 4560a—4, of the statutes, relating to the closed season for game fish in the Catfish river in Rock county.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Subsection 4, of section 4560a—4, of the statutes, is amended to read: (Section 4560a—4.) 4. In Big Yellow river from mouth to Babcock, Lemonweir from mouth to mouth of Bear creek, pickerel shall be classed as rough fish. In Lake Koshkonnong, *that part of the Catfish river lying in Rock county*, and that part of the Rock river lying in Jefferson and Rock counties, there shall be no closed season for game fish caught with hook and line, except large mouth bass and small mouth bass.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 375.

AN ACT to amend section 4389 of the statutes, relating to the abuse of inmates of institutions.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 4389 of the statutes is amended to read: Section 4389. Any officer or other person in charge of or em-

ployed in any hospital or asylum for the insane, poorhouse, workhouse, state prison, state reformatory, jail, *police station or other place of confinement*, school for the deaf and dumb or blind, the state public school, home for the feeble minded, house of correction, industrial school for boys or girls or orphan asylum who shall abuse, neglect or ill-treat any person confined therein or an inmate thereof, *or who shall permit any other person so to do* shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not more than one year or by fine not exceeding two hundred dollars.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER 376.

AN ACT to amend section 1438 of the statutes, authorizing the sale and conveyance of town cemeteries.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1438 of the statutes is amended to read: Section 1438. 1. The town board of any town, when so instructed by a lawful vote of the electors thereof, shall purchase in the name of such town suitable grounds to be used exclusively as a town cemetery, at a price not exceeding the price limited by such vote. Such board shall cause the same, from time to time, to be surveyed, divided and platted into lots of such size and with such avenues, alleys and walks as they shall direct, and a map thereof to be filed in the office of the town clerk, and inclose such grounds with a suitable fence as soon as practicable.

2. *The town board of any town when so instructed by a lawful vote of the electors thereof, shall sell and convey any such town cemetery to a cemetery association incorporated under the provisions of this chapter.*

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
