CHAPTER 159.

AN ACT to create section 1411—5 of the statutes, relating to the public health.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. There is added to the statutes a new section to read: Section 1411—5. The local board of health of each township, incorporated village or city with the consent of the state board of health shall have power to establish quarantine and to order and execute what is reasonable and necessary for the prevention and suppression of disease; to forbid public gatherings when deemed necessary to control epidemics, and to condemn and abate conditions causative of disease by means of rules and regulations which shall be consistent with the state law and the rules and regulations prescribed by the state board of health.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.

CHAPTER 160.

AN ACT to create section 2394—96 of the statutes, relating to farm labor agencies.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. A new section is added to the statutes to read: Section 2394—96. The clerk of every city, town and village, in which there is no licensed or public employment agency as provided in section 2394—86 of the statutes, shall solicit, receive and record applications of persons seeking employment on farms for any period of time, and of persons desiring to employ such labor, and every such employer shall pay to any such clerk twenty-five cents for each time he assists in furnishing such labor. The clerk of every city, town and village, serving under the terms of this act, shall, on or before the first day of each month, report all placements made by him to the industrial commission, to be by them compiled as part of the general employment statistics of the state.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage and publication.
