Sec. 3. The said corporation shall have power to con-Powers. tract and be contracted with, sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded with, answer and be answered unto, in all courts of this state, and shall be vested with all the powers and privileges necessary to carry out and fulfill the ob-

jects of their corporation.

SEC. 4. The said corporation shall have further power to establish for its government a constitution and by-laws, not inconsistent with the constitution or laws of this state; to have and use a common seal, and alter the same at pleasure; to erect a building in or near the village of Janesville for its accommodation, and to that end to obtain and hold or convey a lot or lots of land in or near said village, not exceeding in value twenty-five thousand dollars, and such amount of personal property as the said institute may obtain by purchase, donation or otherwise.

act.
