Joint Resolution of the Senate and Assembly of the State of Wisconsin to the United States, in relation to the removal of the Stockbridge Indians.

Whereas, The difficulties heretofore existing in relation to titles to lands, at the town of Stockbridge, Calumet county, has materially retarded the improvement of that part of our state. Providing for settlement with Munsee and Stockbridge Indians

And whereas, It is understood that lately an arrangement has been entered into, by a commissioner on the part of the United States and the Stockbridge and Munsee tribes of Indians, providing for a settlement of the said difficulties, and the removal of the said Indians to a new location, in the neighbourhood of the Menominee Indians.

And whereas, It is very desirable that the said arrangements be speedily carried into effect.

Therefore, Resolved by the Assembly, the Senate concurring, That his Excellency, the President, and the Hon. the Senate of the United States, be respectfully requested speedily to ratify and to carry into effect the said arrangement.

Resolved, That the Governor be requested to forward certified copies of this resolution to the President and the Senate of the United States.

NUMBER 5.

Joint Resolution in relation to the Stockbridge and Munsee Indians.

Resolved by the Senate and Assembly of the State of Wisconsin, That the assent of the state is hereby given to the locating, by the United States, of the Stockbridge and Munsee tribes of Indians, on a tract of land to be selected near the south line of the Menominee reservation. Location of same in Menominee reservation.
