

## CHAPTER 164.

AN ACT relating to the public schools in the city of Oshkosh.

*The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :*

Superintendent.

SECTION 1. The Superintendent of Schools in said city shall be, ex-officio, President of the Board of Education, and in cases of a tie, shall be entitled to a casting vote.

Compensation of Superintendent.

§ 2. The compensation of the Superintendent shall be the same as is allowed by law to the Town Superintendents, and it shall be paid, together with the salary of the Clerk, of the Board of Education, from the School Fund: *Provided*, that the compensation of the Superintendent, and of the said Clerk, shall not exceed, for each, the sum of one hundred dollars per annum.

Rules and regulations to be approved by Superintendent.

§ 3. No rules or regulations of said Board of Education for the organization, government, and instruction of the schools of said city, or for their supervision and management, shall be in force unless the same shall be approved by such Superintendent, and in the absence of any such rules and regulations, he shall have all the power conferred upon said Board by subdivision nine, of section thirteen, of an act entitled, "an act in relation to the public schools in the city of Oshkosh," approved March 7, 1856. In case the Superintendent shall not approve any rule or regulation adopted by said Board, under the provisions of said section thirteen, he shall signify his disapproval, in writing, and his reasons therefor, and file the same with the Clerk of said Board, and the same shall be so filed within three days after a copy thereof shall have been presented to him, or he shall be deemed to have approved the same.

When rules and regulations not approved by Superintendent.

School and text books.

§ 4. The Board of Education shall have power to direct as to the school or text books to be used in the public schools of said city, subject however to the concurrence and approval of the Superintendent.

Limit of money which may be raised.

§ 5. The Common Council of said city shall not have power to levy, in any one year, to defray the current expenses of the public schools, exceeding the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars, nor shall they have power to levy, in any one year, a greater sum than five thousand dollars, for the purchase of school house sites and the building of school houses, nor shall

any moneys raised for such purpose be appropriated to any other purpose.

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§ 6. No contracts for the employment of teachers shall extend beyond the second Monday of April next succeeding the date of such contract.

§ 7. This act shall take effect from and after its passage.

## CHAPTER 166.

AN ACT to amend chapter 345, of the Private and Local Laws of 1857, entitled "An act to incorporate the village of Black Earth."

*The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. Subdivisions thirteen (13), fifteen (15), and seventeen (17), of section thirteen (13), of chapter three hundred and forty-five (345), of the Private and Local Laws of 1857, entitled "An act to incorporate the village of Black Earth," are hereby repealed.

§ 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

## CHAPTER 170.

AN ACT to amend chapter 193, of the Private and Local Laws of the year 1859, entitled "An act to incorporate the village of Oconto."

*The People of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. That chapter 193, of the Private and Local Laws of 1859, entitled "An act to incorporate the village of Oconto," be and is hereby amended as follows: By striking out the word "east," in the third line of section two, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "west;" also by striking out the word "west," in the fourth line in the same section, and insert in lieu thereof, the word "east;" also by striking out the word
