

## CHAPTER 54.

[Published March 16, 1863.]

AN ACT to amend chapter 134 of the general laws of 1858, entitled "an act concerning testimony."

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows :*

In case of personal injuries, married women may be witnessed on their own behalf.

SECTION 1. Section two of chapter 134 of the general laws of 1858, entitled "an act concerning testimony," is hereby amended, by adding thereto the following words, viz.: "And in case of an action for damages for personal injuries to a married woman, this section shall be so construed as to allow such married woman to be a witness on her own behalf, in the same manner as if she were not married."

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

## CHAPTER 55.

[Published March 17, 1863.]

AN ACT to amend chapter 13 of the general laws of 1862, entitled "an act to provide for the publication of the reports of the several state departments and state institutions."

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows :*

2,000 of each report to be printed.

SECTION 1. Section 1 of chapter 13 of the general laws of 1862, is hereby amended, so as to read as follows : "Section 1. Within ten days after the annual reports of the several state departments and institutions shall have been placed in the hands of the governor, he shall deliver them to the public printer, who shall immediately proceed to print two thousand copies of each of said reports, twelve hundred of which shall be folded and stitched in pamphlet form, three hundred for the use of the institution or department making the same, and the remainder shall be laid before the legislature

1,200 of each to be bound in pamphlet form.

at the commencement of the ensuing session, for the use of the members. The remaining eight hundred of each of said reports, together with the annual message of the governor to the legislature first to convene after the delivery of said reports, shall be bound into eight hundred volumes, each containing one of each of said reports and message, and shall be delivered to the superintendent of public property within one month after the commencement of the legislature, who shall retain fifty copies for the use of the state departments, one hundred and fifty copies for the use of the next succeeding legislature, and lay the remainder before the legislature then in session.”

800 of each, together with message, to be bound into 800 volumes.

When to be delivered, and how distributed.

SECTION 2. So much of any act as requires the printing of the reports of any of the state departments, or public institutions, in any greater or less number, or in any other form than that required by this act, is hereby repealed.

Repeal.

## CHAPTER 56.

[Published March 16, 1863.]

AN ACT to extend the time for the collection of the village taxes in the village of Oconto, in this state.

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows :*

SECTION 1. The time for the collection of village taxes, in the village of Oconto, in the county of Oconto, is hereby extended till the first Monday of April, 1863.

Time extended to April 6th.

SECTION 2. The marshal of said village shall have the same power and authority to collect the taxes contained in said village roll, after as before such extension of the time for the collection of said taxes; and the return of the village marshal to the village treasurer, within the time limited for the collection of taxes by this act, shall be as valid as if made pursuant to the original warrant, and no extension had been made.

Authority to marshal, and his return.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
