

GENERAL LAWS.

CHAPTER 1.

[Published January 25, 1872.]

AN ACT to authorize the city of Green Bay to convey to the United States, Grass Island, at the mouth of the Fox River, for the purpose of erecting thereon a light-house, and to convey all the interest of the state to said island.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. The city of Green Bay is hereby authorized to sell and convey to the government of the United States, the island at or near the mouth of Fox river on Green Bay, commonly called Grass Island, or so much as may be necessary for the purpose of erecting a light-house thereon, and such other buildings as may be necessary; and a conveyance thereof legally executed by the mayor in the name of the city of Green Bay, and under the corporate seal of said city shall vest the title thereof in the United States and its assigns forever. May sell and convey Grass Island.

SECTION 2. In case any right, title or interest shall remain in the state of Wisconsin, all its right, title and interest is by this act conveyed to the government of the United States for the uses and purposes in section one of this act expressed. State to convey all right, etc.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
