

ing said dam or dams and other improvements, and the facilities thereby obtained for floating and driving logs and timber on said Cauley Creek, shall be and are hereby authorized and permitted to charge, and entitled to collect and receive, of any and all persons owning or controlling logs and timber, or either, in said Cauley Creek, ten cents per thousand feet, board measure, as toll, on all logs and timber designated and intended to be driven or floated down said Cauley Creek. The amount of said logs or timber to be determined by and under the direction of the lumber inspector of the district in which said Cauley Creek is situate, or by mutual agreements of parties.

Operation of dam.

SECTION 3. The said George H. Ray, his associates or assigns, shall operate said dam or dams, and other improvements, at all times during the season of driving logs, in an impartial manner, and in a way to afford the greatest facility to all parties driving logs down said Cauley Creek.

Tolls a lien upon logs.

SECTION 4. The said George H. Ray, his associates and assigns, shall have a lien upon all logs put in Cauley Creek, that may be floated or driven down said Cauley Creek, for and at the rate of the charges for toll mentioned and allowed him in section two of this act; and any and all charges for toll that said George H. Ray may have on account of the erection, maintaining and operating said dam or dams, and other improvements, shall be a lien upon such logs or timber, and unless paid on or before ten days after the same are driven or floated out of said Cauley Creek, all of such charges for toll may be enforced by said George H. Ray, his associates or assigns, in the same manner as other liens for services and labor performed on logs are enforced under the laws of this state.

SECTION 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

## CHAPTER 128.

AN ACT for the relief of E. J. Pettys.

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:*

Appropriation, \$40.

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated to E. J. Pettys, from the general fund, out of any moneys not

otherwise appropriated, the sum of forty dollars, being for license money paid into the state treasury May 1, 1878, by said E. J. Pettys, for a license to travel and trade within this state with two horses and wagon, the said E. J. Pettys being a cripple and incapacitated for labor with his hands.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect from and after its passage and publication.

### CHAPTER 129.

AN ACT for the relief of James S. Wells.

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows.*

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated to James S. Wells, from the general fund, out of any moneys not otherwise appropriated, the sum of twenty and twenty-five one-hundredth dollars, being for license money paid into the state treasury May 1, 1878, by said James S. Wells, for a license to travel and trade within this state with a one-horse wagon; the said James S. Wells being a cripple and incapacitated for labor with his hands. Appropriation,  
\$29.25.

SECTION 2. This act shall be in force from and after its passage and publication.

### CHAPTER 130.

AN ACT to appropriate to the Wisconsin State Hospital for the Insane certain sums of money therein named.

*The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated out of any money in the general fund not otherwise appropriated, to the Wisconsin State Hospital for the Insane, the sum of fifty-eight thousand six hundred and forty-seven dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$58,647.87), for current expenses for the year 1879. Appropriation,  
\$58,647.87.
