CHAPTER 115

AN ACT to renumber 151.04 (5) ; to amend 151.02 (7) (intro. par.) ; and to create 151.04 (5) of the statutes, relating to licensing drug dealers and increasing state revenues \$250 annually.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. 151.02 (7) (intro. par.) of the statutes is amended to read:

151.02 (7) (intro. par.) The board, upon notice and hearing, may suspend or revoke the registration of one guilty of felony or gross immorality, or who is addicted to alcoholic liquors or narcotic drugs, *or addicted to the use of barbiturates to an extent affecting his fitness as a pharmacist*, or whose registration was secured by fraud or mistake or who has been guilty of a violation of this chapter or of violations of any of the rules or regulations of the board, or who has been guilty of acts of unprofessional conduct as herein defined. No such revocation shall become effective until 20 days after notice of the decision of the board has been served upon the person accused. Decisions of the board under this section shall be subject to review as provided in ch. 227 and in case the provisions thereof are invoked by the accused within such 20-day period, such order of revocation shall become effective only at such time as may be ordered by the court. Unprofessional conduct means:

SECTION 2. 151.04 (5) of the statutes is renumbered 151.04 (6).

SECTION 3. 151.04 (5) of the statutes is created to read:

151.04 (5) No person, firm or corporation shall engage in the sale or distribution at wholesale of any of the drugs defined in s. 151.07 (1) (a) to any of the classes of persons enumerated in s. 151.07 (8) without first obtaining a license for such purpose from the state board of pharmacy. The fee for such license shall be \$10 per annum and a license shall expire one year after the date of issuance. Such license or renewals thereof shall be issued in the discretion of the board to responsible applicants of good reputation.
